Mobile Home Owners Schedule Meeting

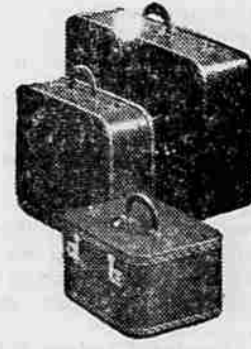
