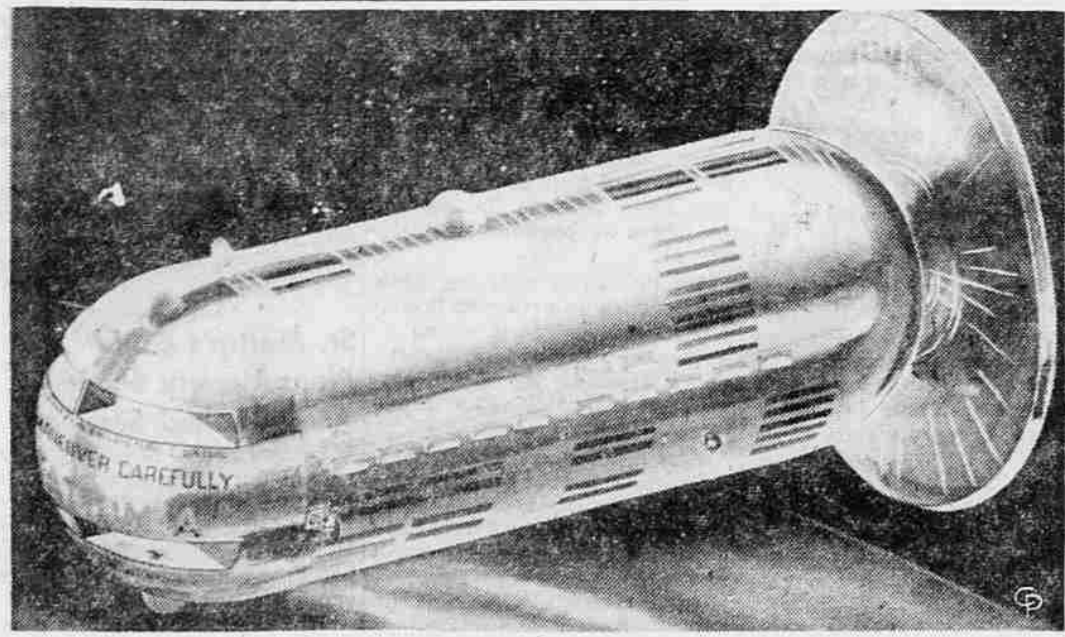


Two Killed, Three Injured In Auto Accidents

DEMONSTRATIONS CALLED OFF

Congressmen Move To Upset School Segregation Ruling Signed 'Declaration' To House, Senate

Washington — (U.P.) — Ninety-six Southern congressmen threw their powerful support today behind "all lawful means" to upset the Supreme Court's school segregation decision.

In a strongly worded "declaration of constitutional principles" the 19 senators and 77 House members Sunday night denounced the ruling as a "clear abuse of tribunal power" that has sown "hatred and suspicion" throughout the South.

They commended states for lawful attempts to resist integration but called for all citizens to "scrupulously refrain from disorder and lawless acts." Milder Than Original

The statement was considerably milder than the original draft which some Southern lawmakers refused to sign. But it was one of the strongest criticisms of the high court by a group of congressmen in recent years. It was to be presented in both Houses today by Sen. Walter F. George (D-Ga.) and Rep. Howard W. Smith (D-Va.).

In the declaration, the Southerners said "We pledge ourselves to use all lawful means to bring about a reversal of this decision, which is contrary to the Constitution, and to prevent the use of force in its implementation."

They contended that the court had no constitutional authority for its ruling and accused the high tribunal of "unwarranted exercise of power" that is "creating chaos and confusion in the states principally affected."

They warned that the public school systems of several states may be destroyed by "outside agitators... threatening immediate and revolutionary changes."

State departments were asked to anticipate any danger points to prevent a threat to life or property as much as possible.

The governor points out that current reports indicated record-breaking stream flows in Oregon this spring. The reports were based on heavy snowfall in 14 major watersheds in the state. That could mean damaging floods in different sections of the state, he explained.

"It is my wish that all state agencies concerned in any way with these potential flood threats take every available step, first, to anticipate any danger points in order that loss and suffering may be prevented or kept to an absolute minimum; second, to review their plans for immediate action should an emergency arise; and third, to give the fullest cooperation to the Army engineers, the Red Cross, and other state and federal agencies that may be involved in either preliminary planning or emergency assistance measures," Gov. Smith said.

Crater Lake Rim Road Reopened to Traffic

The road from Annie Springs to the rim of Crater Lake was opened to the public yesterday morning for the first time in more than three weeks, and some 200 people visited the rim.

The road was closed last Feb. 18 because of snow, and for safety reasons because of the threat of avalanches. Park rangers said there were some avalanches which would have buried a car during the closure.

State approaches to the park on Highway 62 were closed two days during the period, and closed part of the day three other days. The closures were due to state equipment breakdowns.

Total snow depth at Crater Lake today is 180 inches, compared to about 80 inches about this time last year.

Bill May Compound Problem, Solon Says

Washington — (U.P.) — Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson said today that "the farm bill as it now stands—shorn of 90 per cent price supports... could compound our farm surplus problem."

Johnson said that killing rigid high supports and retaining the administration's flexible price support program as the Senate has voted to do may have these results:

"Fewer farmers will want to participate in the soil bank plan because of lower supports. And farmers will try to produce more and more in the hope that they will make up, in bulk, the income lost by lower supports on each item."

Bids on Talent Job Set for April, May

Bids on the first construction for the Talent project will be called in April or May, according to the Denver office of the bureau of reclamation.

Funds for construction of the \$22,000,000 irrigation and reclamation project will become available July 1, if the administration's budget is approved by congress this session. The budget calls for \$2,400,000 for construction during fiscal year 1957.

Dam and Tunnel

Among the first bids called will be for Howard Prairie dam, a 90-foot high earthfill structure across Beaver creek in the Green Springs area. Also scheduled for bid call will be a 4,100-foot tunnel, six feet in diameter, which will carry water under the summit of the Green Springs pass on its way to the site of the proposed power house.

Also scheduled tentatively for bidding in April or May are construction of 1,100 lineal feet of 54-inch and 325 feet of six-inch precast concrete pipe siphon and two concrete bench flumes, part of the rehabilitation work under way on the Medford and Rogue River Valley Irrigation districts. On Medford Canal

Another bid slated for the rehabilitation project is for 1,860 lineal feet of concrete pressure pipe or steel cylinder pipe siphon to replace an existing 44-inch wood stave pipe siphon on the Medford canal.

Work on the Talent project and the rehabilitation jobs is expected to take four or five years to complete.

Johnson Predicts 'Fruitful' Study

Washington — (U.P.) — Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson said today that the Senate's investigation of lobbying will be "fruitful" despite delays in getting it organized.

The Texas Democrat said he regrets that some people believe the delay in launching the investigation will limit its scope or effectiveness.

In rapid fire weekend activity the Lobbying Investigating committee finally cleared its major hurdle, a partisan dispute over rules, and named Sen. John L. McClellan (D-Ark.) chairman. Immediately the group began searching for a "quality" staff.

McClellan promised all possible speed. But he cautioned that it will not be possible to organize the staff for such an important investigation quickly.

The investigation was ordered by the Senate after the furor which developed over a \$2,500 campaign contribution, over the natural gas bill.

Kefauver Says He May Get Half of NH Votes

Manchester, N.H. — (U.P.) — Sen. Estes Kefauver predicted today he would win "more than a majority of the delegates" from New Hampshire in tomorrow's first-in-the-nation primary.

The outcome of the voting will be the first test of strength between Kefauver and Adlai E. Stevenson. Kefauver is visiting the state for the third time to seek support and control of New Hampshire's 12-member 8-vote delegation to the Democratic national convention.

Stevenson supporters have entered a full slate of delegates favorable to the former Illinois governor. But Stevenson has not campaigned actively in the state and has said he has nothing to gain from entering the primary.

Delegates favorable to Gov. Averell Harriman of New York and Gov. G. Mennen Williams of Michigan also entered in the primary contest.

Bulganin Expresses Cocktail Pleasure

Moscow — (U.P.) — Premier Nikolai Bulganin thanked President Eisenhower last night for opening the "path to martinis" during the Geneva summit conference last summer.

Bulganin expressed his pleasure with the American cocktail during an exceptionally jovial cocktail party last night for Danish Premier Hans C. Hansen.

"We cannot forget those moments when we drank martinis to world peace and friendship," Bulganin said in a scene of rare conviviality.

Mollet To Present Disarmament Plan

Paris — (U.P.) — Premier Guy Mollet announced today that France and Britain will present a new plan for world disarmament. He called on the United States to support the proposal.

Mollet made the announcement at a lunch meeting of the Foreign Press Association shortly before facing four crucial votes of confidence in the National Assembly on his Algerian policies.

Mollet was assured of a massive parliamentary majority when Communist leader Jacques Duclos announced that his 150-deputy bloc would vote for the Premier in the confidence test.

'Hostile Elements' Planned Disruption

Athens, Greece — (U.P.) — Greece today called off nationwide anti-British demonstrations when a church leader warned that Communist elements were planning to create trouble during the meetings.

The demonstrations were called by Greek Orthodox Archbishop Spyridon in protest against British deportation of Archbishop Makarios from Cyprus and had the full approval of the angry Greek government.

The archbishop announced today the demonstrations had been called off just a few hours before they were to have taken place and warned that "hostile elements" were planning to disrupt them.

Call Out Troops

Although the government approved the demonstrations, it warned against any disorders and called out heavy concentrations of police and troops to protect British, American and Turkish nationals and property during the meetings.

Rioting Greeks already had vented their anger Saturday by stoning British buildings and burning that Union Jack. Worse disorders had been feared today when official church demonstrations had been scheduled.

Cyprus itself was reported ominously quiet, with a general strike at an end. Anti-British activity was small. A few bombs were thrown but nothing on the scale that was expected as a protest against the deportations of Makarios.

Observers in Nicosia said the stiff British crackdown after the arrest and deportation of Makarios was largely responsible for putting a clamp on large-scale operations against the British.

U.S. Maps Plan for Cyprus Negotiating

Washington — (U.P.) — The United States mapped plans today to exert strong diplomatic pressures to get the British and Cypriots negotiating the Cyprus crisis, again.

Undersecretary Herbert Hoover Jr., conferred with President Eisenhower today. They were expected to discuss not only Cyprus but the border clashes between Israel and her Arab neighbors and the British Jordan dispute.

The United States feared that the furor aroused by Britain's decision to arrest and deport Greek Nationalist leader Archbishop Makarios from Cyprus could seriously threaten the solidarity of free world defenses in Europe. It was specifically concerned about the effect on the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and the Greek-Turkish Yugoslav Balkan defense pact.

State Police Capture Hults' Hitchhiking

Albany, Ore. — (U.P.) — State police Saturday captured escaped convict Ralph John Hults, as he was hitchhiking a ride along the Pacific highway, two miles south of here.

A statewide search had been underway for the 36-year-old convict since he walked away from a prison work gang on Thursday night.

Gov. Smith Describes Tax, Service Relationship Here

Gov. Elmo Smith spoke briefly about state services and their relation to taxation at a breakfast here this morning at the Jackson hotel.

Gov. and Mrs. Smith stopped here as part of a brief tour of southern Oregon. Following the breakfast they attended a coffee hour in Ashland and a luncheon in Grants Pass.

Gov. Smith enumerated the services performed by the state and stated that while taxation is unpleasant, it is necessary in order for the state to perform the services.

The breakfast was attended by about 90 people. Governor and Mrs. Smith were introduced by Robert Root. This was the governor's second visit to Medford since taking office in February.

They appeared on a telecast over station KPBS last night and later attended a dinner at the home of Donald Faber, Central Point.

At a coffee hour at the Elks lounge in Ashland, attended by about 120 people, the governor urged Republicans to take an active interest in the coming political campaign.

New Incidents Reported

Israel Says Troops Concentrating on War-Like Frontier

Jerusalem (Israeli Sector) — (U.P.) — Israel today reported new border incidents with Egypt, Syria and Jordan and accused Egypt of concentrating troops and armored forces along the frontier in a war-like atmosphere.

In Cairo the Arab "big three" conference was ending with the heads of state of Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Syria lining up their cold and hot war policies against Israel but failing to "buy" Jordan away from British influence.

Cargo Ship

In the Suez Canal an American cargo ship, the James Monroe, was moving toward Saudi Arabia with 18 U. S.-built Walker Bulldog tanks. The ship, conveyed by Egyptian vessels, was expected to traverse the canal some time today and head for Saudi Arabia.

The United Nations Armistice commission promised an immediate investigation of the new Israel charges made by a spokesman for the Israeli Foreign Ministry. Israel said the troop concentrations constituted a "direct threat" to Israel security.

Israel said increasing numbers of Egyptian fighting forces had massed in recent weeks in the disputed Gaza Strip and the El Arish areas in violation of the armistice agreement and far exceeding any defense requirements.

Israel also reported these new incidents along the border.

1. An Israeli army spokesman said a patrol captured three Jordan infiltrators near Lachish after a brief fight and then encountered a second group of Jordanian infiltrators and drove them off in a second fight.

2. A spokesman said Syrian troops fired several shots at an Israeli fishing vessel on Lake Kinneret. The vessel was not hit.

3. A spokesman said an Egyptian position opened fire twice on Israel positions in the Kissufim area east of the Gaza Strip. The Israelis returned the fire and there were no casualties.

Zone Change Hearing Slated by Planners

A public hearing on change of zone from class 1-B (two family) to class II (multiple family) for the area from Clark st. to Jackson Blvd., between Summit ave. and "Broad st., will highlight the city planning commission meeting at 7:30 p.m. today in the city hall.

Also on the agenda will be new date for a hearing on the proposed agricultural zoning ordinance. Commissioners will consider final approval of Comice Village subdivision, tentative plot of Jefferson subdivision, and proposed subdivision regulations.

Eagle Point Youth Arrested for Whistle

A 17-year-old Eagle Point boy was arrested by city police Sunday.

The charge was described by officers as follows:

"Violation of city ordinance 3440, section 75 ('Wolf' Whistle)."

The accused forfeited bail.

Hitchcock To Remain In GOP Primary Race

Portland — (U.P.) — Phillip S. Hitchcock, former state senator from Klamath Falls, announced today that he was staying in the race for the Republican nomination for U.S. senator.

"I feel that the people of Oregon have a right to make a choice on who they want to carry the Republican standard in the general election," he said in a brief statement.

Hitchcock, 51, is now public relations director at Lewis and Clark College here.

Candidacy Question

His candidacy had remained a question after Interior Secretary Douglas McKay's sudden announcement last Friday that he would seek the GOP senatorial nomination in the May 18 primary. Lamar Tooez, another announced candidate, withdrew after McKay's entry into the race.

Thus a four-cornered battle shaped up for the GOP nomination to oppose Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) this fall. Others in the race include Elmer Deetz, Canby dairy farmer, and George Altwater, a Portland civil engineer.

Completely Loyal

Hitchcock said, "I remain completely loyal to President Eisenhower. As an early and strong supporter of the President, I am certain he did not mean to endorse one Republican candidate against another."

He added that "many, many people have urged me not to withdraw. I feel an obligation to these people who support me and who are working actively in my behalf."

Hitchcock will be in Medford next Monday to address a public meeting sponsored by Jackson County Republican Women.

Student Expelled At Alabama Riot

Tuscaloosa, Ala. — (U.P.) — Leonard Wilson, 20, pro-segregation student leader at the University of Alabama, has been expelled for his part in the campus race riot that preceded expulsion of negro co-ed Autherine Lucy, it was announced today.

The university Board of Trustees said it had expelled Wilson, suspended four other students, and approved disciplinary action against 25 others.

The trustees action followed an investigation by a university committee formed recently to investigate the riotous demonstrations over the entrance of the 26 year old Negro co-ed, later expelled herself for bringing charges against the university that she could not prove.

The trustees said three other students under investigation "have withdrawn from the university and will not be readmitted unless, at the completion of the investigation, their records have been cleared."

Fund Drives Planned By GOP, Democrats

Washington — (U.P.) — The Republican and Democratic national committees are opening grass roots fund drives aimed at collecting small campaign contributions from millions of voters.

The Democrats will use spot television announcements soliciting "small contributions from the rank and file of the party." They will give the drive a trial run today over TV stations in Des Moines, Ia., and Dayton, Ohio.

The Republicans said their drive will be conducted from door to door by an army of women volunteers. The drive—based on the theme "Thank you, Mr. President." — will be held in most states in April.

Super-Carrier Forrestal Assigned to Mediterranean

Aboard the Forrestal — (U.P.) — The super-carrier Forrestal, the world's mightiest warship, will sail for the troubled Mediterranean in January.

The 70,000-ton carrier, symbol of American seapower, will join the U.S. Sixth Fleet. A battalion of Marines was ordered to join the Sixth Fleet last week.

Reporters got the impression from Johnson's statement that when the Forrestal arrives in the Mediterranean for her first tactical assignment she will carry the new super-jet fighters and high-speed bombers.

This admittedly is not the case today. The approximately 80 planes on the Forrestal now are approaching obsolescence.

Police Blame Speed For Fatal Crash; '56 Deaths Now 5

McLeod Man Injured When Truck Rolls

Two men were killed and three others were injured, one seriously, in four week end accidents in Jackson county. High speed was blamed by police in the fatal crash, and for two other of the accidents.

A three-car collision at about 1:22 a.m. Sunday about two miles north of Medford on the Crater Lake highway resulted in the death of Lloyd Willson Burley, 58, route 1, box 173, Eagle Point, and William Curtis Morris, 25, route 2, box 733, Central Point.

At High Speed

Police said Morris was traveling south at an apparent high rate of speed, and had passed several cars when his vehicle struck, head-on, a pickup driven by Wayne Lowell Reed, 21, route 2, box 220, Medford. Reed was not hurt.

Both Burley and Morris were alone at the time of the accident. Their cars were demolished, police said. Conger-Morris funeral home has charge of both bodies, and will have the funeral services, which are pending. Burley had lived in the valley for about 10 years, coming from Spokane, Wash. For a time he owned and operated a horse concession at Lake of the Woods resort.

The double fatality brought to three the number of traffic deaths in Jackson county over the week end. An unidentified pedestrian was killed early Saturday morning on Highway 99 near Talent. The county coroner's office believes he was Frank or Ed James, about 38, but they have no further information as to his identity.

5 Deaths This Year

Traffic deaths this year now stand at five, of which three were pedestrian fatalities.

Bernard Austin Wild, 42, McLeod, suffered extensive bruises and possible serious internal injuries at 7:20 p.m. Sunday when he lost control of his pickup on a curve 1½ miles south of the Rogue river bridge in Shady Cove. The pickup, which was traveling at high speed, rolled over, coming to rest on the driver, police said.

He was taken to the Shady Cove clinic by a doctor, then to Community hospital by Medford ambulance service. He was reported in good condition this morning. Police cited him for failure to operate on the right side of the highway.

Near Same Spot

At 4:25 p.m. Saturday a sedan driven by Lewis William Dodson, 26, of 819 North Central ave., left the highway near the same spot, about 1.2 miles south of the Shady Cove bridge, and went over a 20-foot embankment. Dodson was going north at high speed and lost control, police said. He was treated for cuts and bruises at the Shady Cove clinic, and was cited for failure to operate on the right side of the highway.

Lewis Elmer Thompson, 51, of 1116 East 11th st., Medford, escaped with minor injuries this morning when the gasoline-laden Associated Oil company truck he was driving was struck by a Southern Pacific diesel locomotive at the oil company crossing a half-mile south of Medford.

Truck Flipped Over

State police said the truck was turned end-for-end and flipped on its side. Gasoline did not ignite, although the truck was badly damaged. A fire department pumper stood by after the accident, which occurred at 7:25 a.m.

Officers said Thompson suffered bruises and shock. Floyd Arno Bewley, Ashland, engineer of the train, told police he did not see the truck until he was within 15 feet of the crossing.

Roseburg — (U.P.) — John Doty, 34, Sutherlin, was killed Saturday night when his car skidded and plunged into a ditch near Roseburg. A passenger, Ella Louis Dunbar, also of Sutherlin, was hospitalized in Roseburg.

Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., today announced that John E. Bishop has been named as its Klamath Falls branch manager to succeed the late David S. Troy. Bishop has been assistant manager since May of 1955.
