Reds Move Atomic Artillery to Korea

Seoul—(U.P.)—U.S. and Republic of Korea officials said today they have received reports the Communists are moving atomic artillery into Red Korea, but added they cannot vouch for the authenticity of the information.

A spokesman at U.S. Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer's headquarters said the past record of Communist duplicity in Korea makes it "obviously a possibility that atomic weapons have been brought in."

Korean Defense Minister Sohn Won II said "informants" of dubious veracity have reported seeing tests of atomic artillery in Red-held Korean territory.

A ROK intelligence officer said Communist soldiers from Korea are being sent to Russia for training in atomic gunnery. He expressed doubt, however, that any A-guns actually have been brought into Red Korea.

He said a 110-ton Russian atomic field gun has been waiting for four months on the north bank of the Yalu River, separating Red Korea from Communist China, but that the poor condition of North Korean roads has made it impossible to move the gun across the border.

A Swiss armistice inspector said he has "no information" on the atomic reports.

Interim Tax Group Discusses Sales Tax

Salem—(U.P.)—State Sen. Rudie Wilhelm Jr., chairman of the Legislature's Interim Tax Study Committee, said today the committee has not and will not consider any sales tax plan which does not repeal the 45 per cent surtax and lower bracket income taxes.

The interim committee held a two-day meeting last week at which time they heard proposals for the incorporation of a three per cent retail sales tax in the state. The committee took no action on the proposals.

"The committee is also desirous of in some way giving real property tax relief, but it is not sure that real property tax relief and the amount of relief desired can both be accomplished with a 3 per cent sales tax which does not include food," Wilhelm said.

Airstrip Named for Seabee Who Lost Life

Washington—(U.P.)—The Navy today named a snow-covered airstrip in the frozen Antarctic wasteland after Max Kiel, a seabee who lost his life in operation "Deepfreeze" a week ago.

Kiel, a tractor driver, died March 5 trying to bridge a crevice in Marie Byrd land in preparation for international geophysical year scientific studies. He was carrying drums of fuel oil and gasoline to an advance station.

Kiel was a son of Mrs. Roma Irene Kiel of Joseph, Ore. The airstrip was named the Max Kiel Air Operations Facility.

Negotiations Continue In Meatcutters Strike

Portland—(U.P.)—Negotiations with federal mediators continued today in an effort to settle a wage dispute before Friday when Portland meatcutters have scheduled a city-wide strike in chain and independent groceries.

Portland Central Labor Council last night voted to place both chain and independent meat retailers on its unfair list Friday unless a settlement is reached.

Buildings Approved By Education Board

Portland—(U.P.)—The State Board of Higher Education, meeting in committee, yesterday gave final approval to plans for buildings at Oregon State and Oregon.

It was indicated that bids would be called for April 19 and 20 for the first unit of the agriculture and biological science building at Oregon State. Estimated cost is \$1,800,000 with another \$150,000 to connect it to the utility tunnel system of the campus.

Also getting final approval were plans for the second of two new men's dormitories at OSC. The building is expected to cost \$900,000.

Final plans for the architecture and allied arts building at the University of Oregon call for construction of the new building and remodeling of the old structure at a cost of about \$550,000.

Portland State College was assured of \$30,000 with which to plan an upper division curriculum in general studies. The board allowed PSC \$15,000 to match \$15,000 offered by the Fund for Advancement of Education.

Gunman Chased After Holdup Attempt

Portland—(U.P.)—Grocer Earl L. Harry, 71, chased a gunman with a stove poker last night after the robber had pointed a revolver at him and pulled the trigger. The gun only clicked.

Harry said he almost caught the bandit who had taken about \$100 from the cash register. He said he was checking his stove when the man came in, carrying a revolver and demanding money. He pointed with a poker in hand at the cash register. The man took the money and told Harry to stop staring at him. When Harry started approaching the gunman pulled the trigger. When it failed to go off he took off, Harry in pursuit.

The gunman jumped over a wire fence and crashed a picket fence and managed to escape.
