Ashland School Board OK's Salary Schedule

Ashland — The Ashland school board this week approved a new schedule of salaries for teachers in the system, and voted to limit to \$300 salary increases for any individual.

The minimum salary will be \$3,400, for teachers with no experience and three years of college. The maximum will be \$5,367 for teachers with five years of experience and a master's degree.

The board indicated that by giving larger increases to the more experienced teachers than to those just starting, the entire staff can be on the new salary schedule within three years.

Six in Family Die In Gas Filled Home

New York — (U.P.) — Six members of a Brooklyn family died today in their gas filled basement apartment and a seventh victim fought for her life in a hospital.

Police found the bodies when they broke into the apartment shortly after sunrise. Only one member of the family, a 7-year-old girl, was alive when they entered. She was rushed to a nearby hospital for emergency treatment.

The victims were identified as Mr. and Mrs. Harry Gonzales, their three children and the children's grandmother. The survivor was identified as Maria Gonzales.

Police said the family apparently was overcome during the night when a defective heater leaked gas.
