Get Medical Assistance For Son's "Weakness"

A woman does not have to tolerate the insults of a grown son. If he cannot treat her properly, she has no further obligations to him.

(Q) "Please help me with my son's weakness... alcohol. He drank when he was younger but now he is 33 and drinks to excess. He becomes nauseated and blames it on my cooking. He says I can't cook any more, but I know it is his excessive drinking that makes him feel sick. He grows about everything I do. When I stay at home and do all I can, he says I don't go out to see what is going on. My husband died two years ago and my son says he doesn't know what he doesn't like about this place, but there is something. What am I to do?" —Mrs. N.C.

(A) Under no circumstances should you put up indefinitely with the way your son is behaving and the way he is treating you. It is hard enough for you to be a widow and have the loneliness of living alone without having a grown son making things even harder for you.

The next time your son becomes nauseated after drinking too much, call in the doctor and let him see if the nausea came from drink or from the food you served your son. Be sure to tell the doctor, ahead of time, how your son drinks and how he is treating you.

It is very probable the doctor will recommend putting your son into a hospital for a time to see if he cannot be cured of the heavy drinking he is doing now. If he thinks this would do some good, cooperate with him and let him send your son where he can get treatment for alcoholism.

When a person drinks to the point that it makes him sick, and when he becomes quarrelsome, taking out his annoyance on anyone who happens to be around, it is just a step away from his becoming dangerous. It is not wise or safe for you to have your son living in your home when he is treating you this way and when, in time, he may threaten your safety or even your life. You cannot cure your son, as he has an antagonistic attitude toward you. But, perhaps the doctor can help him.

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Federal Mediators Optimistic About Strike Settlement

Washington — (U.P.) — Federal mediators were quietly optimistic today about the possibility of a settlement in the 150-day Westinghouse Electric Corp. strike.

Company and union negotiators agreed to continue efforts, begun Tuesday, to draft a wage contract based on a package settlement proposal submitted by a panel of mediators March 3.

Mediators indicated they think the drafting job will take several days "at best"—that is, barring any big blow-ups. Also still to be settled was how to deal with a controversy over 36 discharged strikers.

James B. Carey, president of the striking AFL-CIO Electrical Workers Union, has notified the union's Westinghouse Conference Board—which must approve any agreement—to be prepared to meet Thursday.

Neither company nor union officials would comment as to what progress they made at their all-day meeting Tuesday. Company officials said, however, that there were no "blow-ups" and that both sides "worked hard."

Neither side called for help from federal mediators Tuesday but both sides expect they will have to soon. Mediators said they would be available to help translate their settlement recommendations into contract language.

The settlement proposal calls for a 5-year contract with wage increases ranging from a minimum of 25 cents an hour over that period, plus other fringe benefits.

It also calls for arbitration of the cases of 36 discharged strikers. The union had demanded reinstatement of all discharged strikers. But over the weekend Carey proposed to settle this issue by means of company-union discussions of the discharges at the local level. The issue was discussed briefly Tuesday but not resolved, officials said.

Snowstorms Move Into Mid-West

The dogged winter season, with less than a week left to live, sent a new snowstorm blowing through the midlands today.

From to four inches of snow were posted for Northern Indiana and lower Michigan.

A surprise snowstorm greeted morning rush hour traffic in Chicago and five persons were injured when a bus slid into a utility pole. The injured were hospitalized and doctors said the bus driver was in serious condition. Live electric wires were down for 100 feet around the scene of the crash.

Forecasters said the snow would range as high as five inches in the Chicago area.

The snow served as the icing to a conglomeration of rain, drizzle, and fog in the East and South, and icy rain and fog in Southern Illinois, Missouri, and Northern Arkansas.

The rain-fog combination spread, over the Middle Atlantic states, the Southern Ohio Valley, Tennessee, and Northern Alabama, Mississippi, and Georgia.

Western Tennessee and Kentucky were doused by heavy rains, including a 1.54 downpour at Hopkinsville, Ky.

In Southern Illinois, the late winter outbreak was accompanied by earth tremors and a loud rumble which rattled windows and startled residents. The shake was felt over a wide area, but seismographs reported no earthquake.

Perrydale Youth Wins Speaking Contest

Corvallis — (U.P.) — Roy Chapin of Perrydale won first place in public speaking competition Tuesday at the annual Future Farmers of America convention. He won a trip to Boise next month to compete with winners from other Western states.

The FFA's annual convention, which lasts through Thursday, attracted some 400 boys and advisers.

Central high of Monmouth-Independence won poultry judging and a trip to the national contest as there is no regional competition in the event.

18 Antelope Killed In One Accident

Bend — (U.P.) — A car plowed into a herd of antelope near Millican, Ore., Tuesday, causing the death of 18 of the animals in what was believed to be the largest antelope mortality in Oregon in a single collision between a car and big game.

Driver of the car, M. W. Wauge of Bend, was not injured. State police said Wauge was topping a slight rise in a straight stretch of Highway 20 southeast of Bend when the herd of antelope raced across the road from west to east. The car struck the fringe of the herd and then apparently skidded along the highway sideways, plowing through the main group of animals.

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Proposed Rate Rise May Damage Business

Portland — (U.P.) — Proposed increases in freight rates for Oregon grown holly could do serious damage to the million-dollar industry in Oregon, according to Alfred Teufel, new president of the Oregon Holly Growers association.

Last year Oregon shipped more than 400 tons of the Christmas greenery. Teufel said the proposed increase in freight rates would boost shipping costs 98.8 per cent.

He charged the industry was being discriminated against in the proposals since no other decorative greens except holly would be required to pay a first class rate instead of the present second class rate.

Classrooms To Be in National Traditions

Portland — (U.P.) — At least four Portland organizations of foreign-born citizens are prepared to cooperate with the plan approved for Portland State college to decorate classrooms in a new PSC building according to traditions of other lands.

The "nationality rooms" idea was copied from the University of Pittsburgh where cultural style of 17 nations have been copied.

Although several members of the State Board of Higher Education questioned the wisdom of the idea fearing nationalistic traits would be encouraged, the proposal was finally approved.

Dr. John F. Cramer, president of PSC, said cost of the decoration would be about \$3000 per room, the entire cost to be borne by the sponsoring organization such as the Finlandia Foundation, Italian-American, Greek-American, and Japanese-American organizations.

Start Planning 'Slow Down, Live' Campaign

Salem — (U.P.) — Representatives of government, business industry and civic groups will meet in Portland Friday to start planning Oregon's participation in the nation-wide "slow down and live" program this spring and summer.

The program will be launched on May 30 and will extend through Labor day, Oregon's coordinator for the program will be Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry.

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
