

New York Model Switches To Painting for Career

Rome—(U.P.)—One of our top and typical young models from New York has turned painter. Ivy Nicholson had her first exhibition in Rome last week.

I'm sure that before she became a painter only a few months ago, I would have picked her out of a crowd for a model. Now she is dressing the part of a painter. When I went to her exhibit, she was wearing a fireman's red, grandfather's night-gown type of dress—no belt—and looked ever so much like some aspiring artist one would find on the left bank of Paris or our New York's Greenwich Village.

I can't understand why the majority of painters or sculptors seem to think they must become eccentric. They grow beards or long hair, wear odd, mostly unattractive clothes and, on the whole, look unkempt. I know no other branch of the arts where this is so prevalent.

Too Flat

Ivy can draw but I'm really not sure she can paint. Her paintings are flat while her drawings have another dimension. I told her that I dabbed in clay and black and white and oils but that I did not consider myself a good artist and that when I settled down for a spell I wanted to study anatomy. After I knew the fundamentals of the human form I might get the feel I had a right to take liberties with it and then, and only then, would I be able to hang my emotions and subcon-

scious on it—twist and distort it. She didn't seem to think studying was necessary, saying that teachers gave one too much of their own pattern. But I reminded her that the human form had a very definite pattern—skeletons are pretty uniform.

Mark Of Novice
I also mentioned that I had noticed that the novice usually sluffs off hands and ears, as if they were no part of the human body. Just because they can't really draw them doesn't mean they don't exist. They are sometimes the most characteristic and expressive part of an individual.

This was a challenge to our young Ivy—so she has promised to paint hands for me. What's more, they are to be my hands. I admire her confidence and have a feeling that between now and the time I see her again she will have spent hours on these appendages.

I understand "Vogue" will be having some of her works in one of their issues. Why not? She's one of their gals and I have a feeling that nothing is going to stop her from being good if she can get away from the fakers. Experience and study never thwarted any real artist.

Pear Festival Committee Lists Float Entry Rules

Entry blanks for the Pear Blossom Festival parade, scheduled for Saturday, April 21, at 1 p.m., should be returned to the chamber of commerce office by April 19, Eugene Ferrell, general chairman of the festival committee, announced yesterday.

Ferrell reminded citizens of the following general parade rules:

1. Floats may not be powered but may be mounted on youngsters' wagons.
2. Animals must be no larger than a St. Bernard dog.
3. All pets must be suitably caged, leashed or harnessed. It is permissible to harness pets for purposes of drawing floats as long as the pet is suitably trained for the purpose.
4. Maximum age limit for competitive participation by children in the parade is 12 years.
5. There will be no entry fees.
6. The tentative parade route will be from Ivy street in Library park, down Main street. It will disband at Hawthorne park.

Prizes Given
Prize classifications for float competition will be divided into three groups: commercial floats, organizational floats and individual floats. The winning float in each of these groups will receive a \$25 prize. Second and third place prizes will be \$15 and \$10 in each of the three groups and a grand sweepstakes award for floats determined "best of parade" will be given. Prize for the float with the best design will be \$50, best theme portrayal and originality, \$50, and best comic float \$50.

Ferrell stressed the importance of entering floats under the appropriate heading. He also stressed the importance of returning parade entry blanks on time to enable officials to determine in advance the probable size of the parade.

Hills Creek Reservoir Work Bids to be Called

Portland—(U.P.)—First work on the \$33 million dollar Hills Creek reservoir on the middle fork of the Willamette river in Lane county will be put up for bid Friday, Army Engineers said Wednesday.

The Corps of Engineers will call for bids for construction of a diversion tunnel and Kitson Spring detour road at the reservoir site 40 miles southeast of Eugene. Four years will be required for construction.

Archeologists Study Roman Marble Pavement

Florence, Italy—(U.P.)—Archeologists today studied a section of Roman marble pavement discovered by workers digging foundations for a column in the Piazza Della Repubblica. Scientists believed the pavement, found 11 feet below the present level of the square, belonged to the ancient Roman Forum.

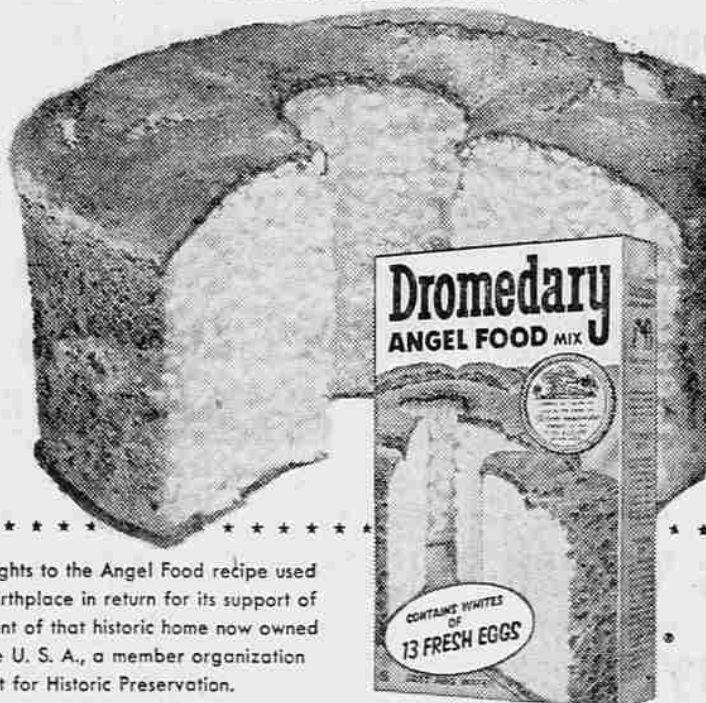

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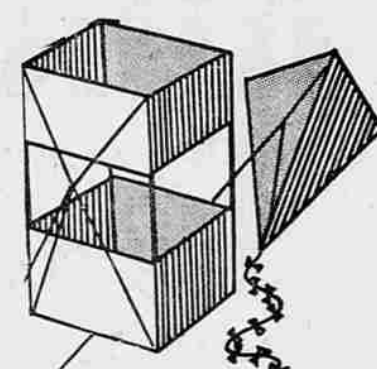
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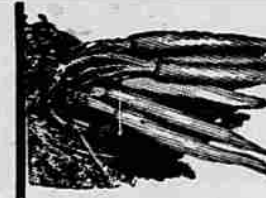
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
