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### McKay Says Change In Education Needed

New York — (U.P.) — Interior Secretary Douglas McKay said last night the "philosophy of education in this country needs a revitalization."

McKay said Russia's stepped-up educational campaign in recent years has been turning out almost twice the number of scientists and engineers as this country.

"Our schools are woefully inadequate," McKay said. He said the fault is not that of the educational system alone; the blame must rest upon the shoulders of almost everyone in America."

McKay said the nation could use at least 50,000 more engineers immediately.

### Portland Attorney Enters Guilty Plea

Portland — (U.P.) — Claude M. Johns Jr., 43, Portland attorney who served as a temporary circuit judge in 1954 and 1955, has pleaded guilty in Federal Court to file federal income tax returns.

He was released on his own recognizance pending a probation office investigation. James Morrell, assistant U. S. district attorney, said the information to which Johns pleaded charged failure to file in 1952 and 1953.
