# Fanfare

McArthur Court, University of Oregon, Eugene—Tournament notes:  
Participation in this Class A-1 high school basketball tourney is not so simple as just playing the games as they come—not even for Medford's Black Tornado. Coach Frank Roelandt called a Thursday morning session of his charges at the physical education building gym. Purpose was to devise and perfect a means of counteracting the pressing defense of their Thursday night opponent, the Milwaukie Mustangs. A full court press was instrumental in the Mustangs' easy victory over the bigger North Salem quint.

**SECOND BEST MARK**  
Medford's high .386 field goaling average was below its .398 mark for the regular season but it was still second best in the first round of the A-1 titular hassle. Top effort was by South Salem in its losing cause to Franklin of Portland. The Saxons fired .410 to the Quakers' .353 and lost 65 to 62. Franklin with 6-9 Bjarne Jensen the big factor won the game on the backboards and at the free line where it got more chances . . . Poorest shooting from the field was by Central Catholic of Portland with .269 in the opener against Lincoln of Portland . . . Eugene and Pendleton broke exactly even in their tangle with 20 for 57 for .351 each.

**BIG MAN TOPS**  
Jensen of the Quakers, tallest man in the tourney, had 32 points and 28 rebounds against South Salem for the top effort in the opening round. But Charlie Warren of Eugene, 6-3, and Len Paola 5-10 of Milwaukie showed that a cager doesn't have to be an exact skyscraper to be an effective rebounder. Warren made 24 retrieves and Paola collected 18 with aggressiveness, good position and timing . . . Jensen is one of the big attractions of the tournament but he isn't the most popular. Nothing wrong with his personality. It's just the towering size advantage of the agile Quaker. When referee's decisions go for him, a good share of the crowd sounds off its disapproval. When the calls go against him, the spectators cheer. Such is the price of being a tall, good basketball player.

**COPPLE DOES WELL**  
Medford's Dick Copple knotted for third high laurels in first round field goal totals. Ed's Barber Shop with 12, Earle Jensen with 10 and 25 points. Copple and Bruce Patterson of South Salem each had nine.

**GAMES CLOSE**  
Designation of the tournament field as a well-balanced one proved true after the opening round of eight was history. Out of the fray Tuesday and Wednesday only one, Milwaukie's win over North Salem, could be called a waltz-away and the Salemites showed they had better stuff in the second half. Medford won by a good margin but was still being pushed early in the fourth quarter. The six other scraps were either club's game right up until the final moments. Three scraps were decided by two points, one by three counters and two by five.

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**UO STAFF HELPS MUCH**  
We were told that an Oregon School Activities association official complained about the sum of \$500 which the tourney publicity set-up at U of O is costing the OSAA. We think that is the wrong attitude. Last year attendance reached a record high and the big classic produced the big share of the \$36,055 the OSAA realized from Class A basketball. The press shouldn't get the whole credit for tourney success but certainly is worthy of a huge share of it. Services provided by Art Litchman, U of O athletics publicity director, and his staff help newspaper and radio men immeasurably in publicizing and keeping up interest in Oregon prepdom's biggest athletic show, the OSAA money is well spent.

**INFORMATION KIT**  
We've mentioned it in past years but the help provided by Art and his aides are worth repeating. The U of O staff, to begin with, furnishes an information kit to members of the press. It contains a card on each team with information on the squad, its record, coach, managers, and nickname and colors. Medford's card, for instance, shows it as No. 1 team in District 6. Height, weight, age and class of the players is given. Names of Coach Frank Roelandt, Assistant Coach Bob Newland, Capt. Bob Tisdell, Managers Ken Kumasawa and Ron Warner are listed along with that of band director Irv Mirick. The card indicates that this is Medford's 18th time in the tournament and that has an all-time tourney mark of 39 wins and 21 defeats. Two other cards contain general team and tourney record information. One shows Medford's season offensive average of 62.3 points per game as second best among the 16 entries here. Pendleton averaged 63.2. The Tornado ranks 14th, however, with its per game defensive mark of 54.6. Best is McLaughlin high's 44.8.

**TO PRINT BOOKLET**  
After each game the UO crew tabulates, mimeographs and distributes the official records of the tussle. After the tourney is over these records of each contest and overall tourney statistics will be compiled into a booklet which will be sold as a souvenir for a nominal sum. For the avid prep hoop fan it will be well worth the price.

**BOYS UP COUNT**  
Tournament attendance records may be off several counts. Wednesday during the noon hour three small boys were seen revolving the turnstiles. Each turn, of course, adds a number on the meter. Don't know how many turns were made before the boys were stopped . . . McLoughlin (Mac) high appears to be making another bid for sportsmanship honors. The players' conduct is of high caliber and the youths make a neat appearance in their white shirts, red bow ties and black sweaters . . . Small pep bands and fast-stepping pep squads again are lending color to the tournament . . . Corvallis girls have gone to the extreme so far this year. Several appeared barefooted on the McArthur maplecourt and danced a lively number.

**HEADLIGHT WOES**
