Salem Attorney Is Appointed to State Liquor Commission

Salem—(U.P.)—Bruce Williams, 37-year-old Salem attorney, and E. Riddell Lage, 48-year-old Hood River fruit grower, were appointed to the Oregon Liquor Control Commission Saturday by Gov. Elmo Smith.

The new members will replace Lester Ireland of Hillsboro and J. Harry Sroufe of Portland, whose retirements were announced Feb. 24.

Williams will succeed Ireland as chairman. His term will expire Jan. 1, 1962. Lage will fill Sroufe's unexpired term ending Jan. 1, 1960.

Lowell Seaton of Albany will be the holdover member of the commission.

Objectives Listed
"In a meeting with the new commission in my office Saturday morning," the governor said, "I named three objectives that I want accomplished this year: Operation that will in every particular earn and justify the confidence of the public in the integrity of administration and freedom from every improper influence; commission policy that advances the purpose of the Knox law which is liquor control rather than sales or promotion of taxes; and more effective protection against the sale of liquor to minors."

The governor continued: "The commission was given assurances of my full support of any changes in procedure or personnel necessary to accomplish these objectives. At the same time that I told them that I would tolerate no politics in liquor control administration, I promised an appeal to the public against permitting continued use of the liquor commission as a political football."

Takes Time
The governor noted that the objectives he had assigned the commission could not be accomplished overnight. "It will take time to do the kind of job upon which I shall insist and, in the meantime, the commission is entitled to freedom from political heckling and interference," he concluded.

Gov. Smith announced his plans to reorganize the commission on Feb. 24 when he took note of Chairman Lester Ireland's request not to be reappointed. His term expired Jan. 1. At that time the governor accepted the "courtesy" resignations of J. G. Sroufe, Portland, and Seaton with the provision that one of them could be held over on the commission and that they serve until new commissioners could be appointed.

ILWU Threatens Tie Up of Hawaiian Sugar

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union has threatened to tie up all Hawaiian sugar traffic if sugar workers in the islands go out on strike.

The ILWU, which represents 17,000 Pacific Coast dock workers, issued the threat Friday after a caucus.

Members attending the meeting said if the territorial sugar workers strike, they will recommend to coast dock workers that they refuse to handle any incoming sugar or out going plantation supplies.

Similar action by the East Coast International Longshoremen's association will be sought they said.

The union said it would hold talks with the Pacific Maritime association before putting any boycott into effect.

The sugar workers, members of the ILWU, voted two weeks ago to strike when negotiations bogged down on a new contract. The old agreement expired Feb. 1.

The ILWU said a final company offer was rejected 12,166 to 679 in a tally counted Thursday.

ILWU Secretary - Treasurer Louis Goldblatt will fly to Hawaii tomorrow to assist in negotiations.

South Must Avoid Violence, Solon Says

Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. Allen J. Ellender said last night the South must avoid lawlessness and violence on the race issue if it wants to escape a "repetition of the reconstruction regimes" that followed the Civil War.

The Louisiana Democrat, one of 101 signers of a "declaration of Constitutional Principles" by southern lawmakers denouncing the supreme court's school desegregation ruling, said any breakdown of governmental authority in the southern states would "open our gates to an invasion by a new and even hungrier breed of carpet-baggers."

Ellender made the statements in a radio broadcast for Louisiana stations.
