Three Injured When Bridge Collapses

Cave Junction — (U.P.)—Three men were tossed 15 feet in the air and then fell 30 feet onto construction debris near here when a section of a bridge under construction across the Rogue River collapsed. None of the three workmen suffered serious injury.

Tom Lindero of Reedsport, contractor for the \$150,000 project, said the accident would delay completion of the bridge on Highway 199 about 10 days and cost \$3000.

Robert Harmon, inspector for the State Highway Department, was standing well out on the bridge when it collapsed. He was treated in Grants Pass for a broken jaw and skull injuries. The other two men were less seriously hurt.

State Highway Maps Released This Week

Salem—The official 1956 Oregon State highway map released this week shows several highway changes completed during the past year.

Included are the Banfield freeway (Highway 30), entering Portland, and the Salem-Portland freeway, the latter cutting 47 miles between the state's two largest cities. Maps of city streets of Salem, Portland, Eugene, Medford, Klamath Falls, Roseburg and Hood River also are incorporated.

Other highway changes noted include reroutings of Highway 99, the Pacific highway, south of Eugene and some minor changes on Highway 30 and adjacent highways in the vicinity of Rainier.

Burgess Elected Head Of Education Group

Portland—(U.P.)—Winfred Burgess, principal of Crook County High School at Prineville, became president of the Oregon Education Association here Friday at the organization's annual convention.

In his inaugural address, Burgess urged a three-point program for the OEA: Teachers should make teaching "more professional," they should guard against makeshift teaching devices designed to cope with increased enrollments, and they should lend support to agencies trying to solve the state's tax problems.

The higher education department of the OEA yesterday named Dr. Willard B. Spalding of Portland State College as president. Dr. Kenneth Lottick of Willamette University was elected vice president and Sister M. Bernadette of Mt. Angel College secretary-treasurer.
