Church to Attend Weather Confab

Robert D. Church, meteorologist in charge of the Medford weather bureau, will attend a conference tomorrow at the University of California college of agriculture at Davis.

The conference, which will include scientists of the bureau and university personnel, will begin a drive by the bureau to develop better weather reporting and climatic research for agricultural purposes.

A five-day program covering weather factors in research has been arranged by Dr. Frederick A. Brooks, professor of agricultural engineering, who has charge of the university's studies in frost protection.

Discussions are planned to establish how and what weather information is important to agricultural production, and the kind of collaboration desirable to speed research at Davis.

Subjects to be covered include the use of punched cards in weather studies, climatic effects on livestock, frost protection, prediction of harvesting dates from weather, and building for and better weather protection.

Nationalist Chinese Sink Three Transports: Taipei, Formosa—(U.P.)—Nationalist Chinese batteries sank three Communist transports west of Matsu during a 65-minute gun battle Saturday, the Nationalists announced.

A communique said gunners on the Nationalist stronghold of Matsu opened fire as the Red vessels steamed southward along the Fukien coast from the Ming river. The communique said one of the transports was "sizeable," but gave no further details.
