Panama Canal Traffic Sets February Record
Balboa, Canal Zone — (U.P.) — Traffic through the Panama Canal set a new record during February, it was announced Wednesday.

A total of 681 commercial vessels passed through the canal setting a new daily average mark of 23.48 ships. The previous high was 23.45 in July, 1955. This does not include government vessels.

Resources Committee Urges Comprehensive Survey of Basin Here

A wide range of subjects pertaining to water resources was discussed this morning at the first meeting of the newly-formed water resources committee of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

First formal action of the committee was to pass a resolution, to be submitted to the chamber board, calling for the State Water Resources Commission to conduct a comprehensive survey

of the Rogue basin at the earliest opportunity.

Such a survey is now in progress in the Umpqua basin, and it probably would be four or five years before one could be made here. But the committee felt that a request to the commission might serve to give the Rogue basin a higher priority than if no such request were made.

The group also went on record favoring a congressional bill now ready for introduction called S-208,000 for construction of fish screens at Savage Rapids dam on the Rogue river. The intakes are considered to be one of the major causes of fish mortality in the river, and the state game commission and the Grants Pass Irrigation district recently reached agreement as to their operation, but the cost of the installation would require federal help.

A report on the progress of the Talent irrigation and reclamation project was given, which indicated that if the budget request of \$2,400,000 is passed, construction can be started this summer. A contract between the bureau of reclamation and the Talent Irrigation district for repayment of the cost of construction is now in the final stages of negotiation.

It was also reported that Congressman Harris Ellsworth has introduced a bill to authorize the corps of Army engineers to conduct and complete a comprehensive survey of the Rogue from a standpoint of flood control, but taking all other factors into consideration. Members of the committee were told such a survey is a necessary first step before a well-thought-out flood control plan can be presented which will take into consideration all interests in the area, including soil conservation, recreation and other objectives.

Discussions of pollution control and of sanitation problems, in relation to water resources, led to a decision to organize the present committee into sub-committees each to specialize in time phase of water resources. The group will meet at the call of an executive committee to study work done by sub-committees.

Elwood Hedberg is chairman of the committee.

Censure Suggested For Five Colleges

Washington — (U.P.) — A special committee of the American Association of University Professors has recommended the censure of five universities and colleges for allegedly violating academic freedom and tenure. This is the largest number of institutions to be recommended for censure by the association at one time. The institutions are the University of California, Ohio State University, Rutgers University, Temple University, and Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia.

In each of the schools faculty members have been dismissed for refusing to cooperate with congressional investigating committees or for pleading the Fifth Amendment against a possible self-incrimination when called before the committees.

Cherry Growers To Oppose Bill

Portland — (U.P.) — The Cherry Growers Industries Foundation voted here yesterday to oppose a House bill which members feel would weaken present fruit tariffs and import restrictions.

The foundation is the national trade association of some 20,000 Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Utah, Michigan and New York commercial cherry growers, processors and handlers.

Members said the House measure, HR 5550, would authorize the government to take part in a new Organization for Trade Cooperation (OTC) which would in effect approve the general agreement on tariffs and trade originally negotiated by the State Department in 1947. The resolution approved here said the "basic objective of OTC is international control and government of world trade and commerce and international intervention in domestic national affairs which may affect world trade and commerce. A specific objective is substantial reduction of tariffs and elimination of all import restrictions."

Giant Fish Ladder In Columbia Planned

Portland — (U.P.) — Plans to turn The Dalles-Celilo canal into a giant fish ladder for Columbia river migratory fish were revealed here today when Army Engineers asked for bids for modification of navigation lock miter gates to permit passage of fish.

Col. Jackson Graham, Portland district engineer, said the canal would be used for fish passage this year only. On Oct. 1, engineers will begin diverting the Columbia river through The Dalles dam powerhouse where it will flow until they are ready to raise the dam pool in two stages during March, 1957.

When the pool reaches 155 feet elevation, The Dalles navigation lock will replace the old navigation canal and fish will use facilities of the dam for upstream passage. Work on the temporary fish gates must be completed by May 10 of this year.

B25 Bomber Crashes; Crew's Fate Unknown

Waco, Tex. — (U.P.) — A B25 bomber with six men aboard crashed near Franklin, Tex., last night but the fate of the crew was not immediately learned.

Connally Air Force Base, where the plane was stationed, said one of its search planes had sighted the wreckage from the air. The base public information office said it was not known if any survivors were sighted by the search plane.

Four members of the crew were identified. They included co-pilot 1st Lt. Peter M. Hisky Jr., 23, Pocatello, Ida.

The decision was reached at a meeting of the two parties at the Rhineland village of Unkel Wednesday. They fought each other bitterly in the Saar referendum last October and the general election in December.
