Back Stairs: Papers Have Wrong Address

 Washington — (U.P.) — Back stairs at the White House: The American News Company delivers newspapers daily to the White House. One of their recent deliveries came in labeled: "V.P. Nixon, Room 361."

There is no room 361 at the White House, but there is one on Capital Hill where Mr. Nixon has his regular quarters. Bill Henry, the California squire who once covered the White House diligently for the National Broadcasting Company, sends in from his orange grove on the sunny shores of California: "Bill Henry — retired. No phone. No address. No business. No money."

Mr. Eisenhower undoubtedly doesn't know it, but his more recent week end in Gettysburg was full of complications for the large press and radio corps accompanying him. Those slick, icy roads around Gettysburg were not fun for the men and women who had to race around in the wake of the President.

Despite much attendant publicity, Robert Montgomery has never been consulted on the lighting and arrangements for the President's weekly news conferences. Favorite jewelry around the White House these days: gold "like" pins worn by secretaries and stenographers. Naturally a

lot of the girls are hoping for assignments on the campaign trips this fall. Few people knew it, but Fred Allen who died last Saturday night was one of Mr. Eisenhower's favorite funsters on radio and television.

A. G. Loew of Falls Church, Va., writes in to differ with R. C. Smith of Salisbury, Mo., who thinks that coronary thrombosis patients never recover completely. Loew says he is 67 years old, suffered a coronary three years ago and now leads what he considers to be a completely active life, as long as he does not lift heavy objects and avoids what he considers undue excitement.

Fire District Tests New Pumper Truck

Central Point—Central Point rural fire protection district's newly-acquired American LaFrance 1,000-gallon per-minute pumper truck was tested for the Oregon Insurance Rating bureau yesterday and passed the test by a safe margin, Assistant Chief Harry Tonn reported.

Tonn stated that the new pumper will be placed in service on April 1 and will be used at both the Central Point and White City stations. The truck will bring to seven the number of vehicles operated by the district. Other vehicles in service are 1000-gallon and 750-gallon pumpers, two 1000-gallon tank trucks, a pick-up truck with pump and tank and a jeep with pump and tank for fighting grass fires.

Ed Marqueling, Portland, represented the rating bureau at the test at Ross Lumber company pond at White City. Others present were Jack Julver and M. Matkoski, of the American LaFrance company, and fire district officials.

Astoria — (U.P.) — The Dutch freighter Auriga, feared missing for the past several days, was believed sighted late yesterday off the mouth of the Columbia river signalling for a bar pilot. The "vest pocket" ship was en route from Antwerp to Vancouver, Wash., via the Panama canal with a cargo of fertilizer but had not reported her position to the owners since leaving the canal.
