

Kefauver Moves To So. California

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—Sen. Estes Kefauver brings his "Howdy" campaign to the voters of populous southern California today.

The Tennessee Democrat was in the second day of his five-day visit to the Golden State—a visit he hoped would yield him 68 votes in the Democratic presidential convention.

The California primary is June 5. It will be the last one to pit him against Adlai Stevenson before the convention makes its decision.

Kefauver arrived in San Francisco Thursday, showing the politician's traditional eagerness to shake as many hands as he could. He even fed candy to babies.

Greets One and All
San Franciscans appeared to warm up to the senator's folksy approach. He strolled down Montgomery st. in the heart of the financial district, greeting everyone in sight—policemen, cab drivers, office workers and business executives.

To everyone who crossed his path, Kefauver said:
"I'm Senator Kefauver. I hope you'll help me."

He made appearances in the working-class Mission district and in the predominantly Negro Fillmore district. In the latter district he spoke of the necessity of obeying the U.S. Supreme court's decision on segregation.

"I think when the court made its ruling, it laid down the law of the land and the argument is over now," he said.

Lack of Jurisdiction Ruled in Cowlitz Case

Tacoma—(U.P.)—U.S. District Judge George H. Boldt ruled yesterday he has no jurisdiction in the Cowlitz Indian Tribe's \$80,000,000 damage suit against the City of Tacoma.

The tribe charges the city's proposed Cowlitz river dams at Mayfield and Mossyrock would inundate fishing and burial grounds.

After Boldt dismissed the case, attorneys for the Indians made no indication of their plans. The judge said he would not file a formal order dismissing the case from his court until next week in order to give the attorneys time in which to bring forth any other authority which might affect his ruling.

Portland Eastside Trolley Service Aired

Portland—(U.P.)—Multnomah county commissioners yesterday deferred action on preservation of interurban trolley service to west side Portland after approaches to the Hawthorn street bridge are remodeled.

Plans for the approaches do not include trolley tracks. The county had planned to terminate the interurban service on the east side of the city and provide shuttle service across Hawthorne bridge for passengers destined for the downtown business district.

Patrons, however, protested the east side terminal idea and Monroe Sweetland, Milwaukie publisher, questioned the county's authority to modify the service without consent of the Public Utilities commission.

Commissioners said that they would seek legal opinion before reaching a final decision on the service.

Stevenson Admits Purpose Failure

Decatur, Ill.—(U.P.)—Adlai E. Stevenson, seeking support in his native Illinois, admitted last night that he failed to "get across" to the voters in the Minnesota presidential primary.

Stevenson came to Decatur to make his first campaign speech since his upset loss to Sen. Estes Kefauver in Tuesday's Minnesota primary.

His speech had been planned to boost the organization Democratic state ticket. But that was before Stevenson's defeat. It turned out to be Stevenson's opening gun in the April 10 Illinois primary and gave his downstate Illinois backers a chance to show they're still behind him.

An enthusiastic overflow crowd of 800 persons jammed the hall. Many of them told Stevenson they hadn't planned to come, but changed their minds.

Stevenson responded with "a personal word" about how it feels to lose when you are expected to win.

"When, as a candidate for public office, you believe in something and you believe in it strongly and you try to say it to people—and you lose a round in an election battle, as I have in Minnesota—you don't feel injustice or even defeat," he said.

"What you feel is that somehow you haven't been able to get your convictions across. And it makes you all the more anxious to get out and try all the harder to say what you feel so strongly."
