Walter Gieseking, considered one of the greatest pianists of this time, will play his first broadcast of the season when he appears as soloist with the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Sunday, March 25. The program will be broadcast over Radio Station KYJC in Medford from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Guido Cantelli will conduct the orchestra in the second of four broadcast performances as guest conductor.

Mr. Gieseking will perform the Beethoven "Concerto No. 5 in E Flat Major" known as the "Emperor" concerto. Following the broadcast the pianist will leave New York for a number of recitals and orchestral performances throughout the country.

Maestro Cantelli will open the program with the Vivaldi "Concerto Grosso" for string orchestra and the concert will close with "Don Juan," tone poem by Richard Strauss.

In observance of Palm Sunday, a special program will be broadcast for the Woolworth Hour on the same station beginning at 1 p.m. Alex Templeton will play the world premier of his new "pocket-sized" "Sonata."

Miss Nelli Herva, Metropolitan Opera soprano will sing the dramatic aria "Pace, Pace, Mio Dio" from Verdi's opera, "La Forza del Destino" and Cesar Franck's "Panis Angelicus."

The actress returned to her Fifth avenue apartment from Hollywood Thursday night and said on her arrival she would attend actress Rita Gam's wedding. Miss Gam, who will be one of Miss Kelly's bridesmaids at the ceremony April 19 in Monte Carlo, is marrying Thomas H. Guinzberg, 29, a publishing executive.

A relative of the bridegroom said the wedding would take place this afternoon and that the couple planned to leave for Europe tonight by plane.

Miss Kelly told reporters who met her at the airport that she would spend most of the time shopping for her trousseau before she sails for Monaco on April 4.

"I've had no opportunity to do any shopping because I've been working so hard on the picture," she explained. She recently completed the film "High Society" for MGM studios, which may be her last movie.

"I have not asked for a release from my MGM contract," she said when reporters asked about her movie plans. "I'm taking a year's leave of absence."

The prince had said earlier that she would not make any more movies, and the 26-year-old actress emphasized that his word will be final.

"I agree with whatever he decides," she said.

The future princess patiently answered reporters' questions. She admitted she was a little nervous and "very excited" about her wedding, then added wearily:

"The prince and I are awfully tired reading about ourselves, and we thought other people would be also."
