## Bittles Honored At Dinner Party On Anniversary

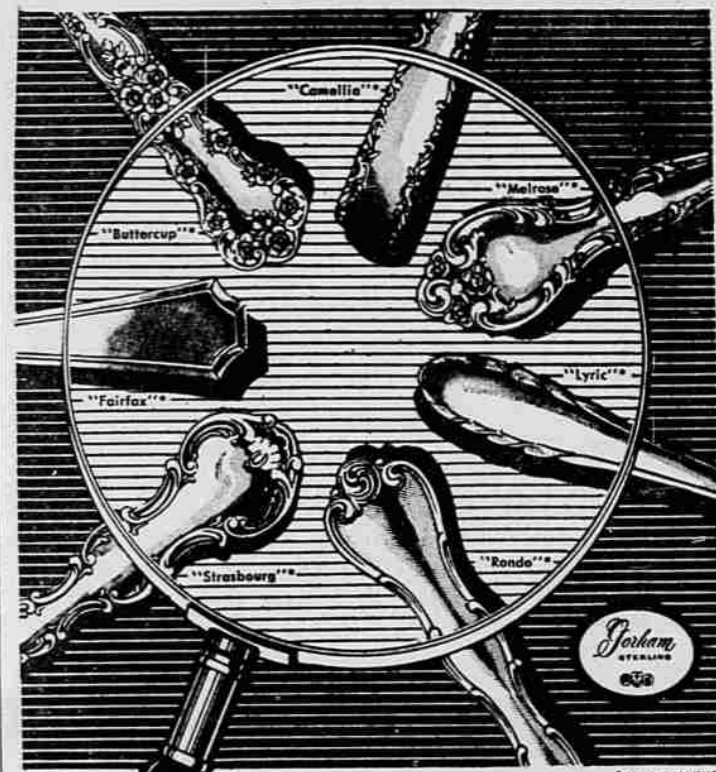
Mr. and Mrs. Louis F. Bittle, Ross lane, were honored guests at a party March 17 which celebrated their 42nd wedding anniversary.
