CATARACTS

Many elderly persons ask me a dozen questions about what will happen if they have their cataracts out.

Can they then use their eyes safely or will they strain them, or, if only one is operated on, will it be all right to use one eye, and so forth. Actually, I see no cause for worry of any kind. Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — Two persons were killed and another injured here early Saturday in an automobile collision.

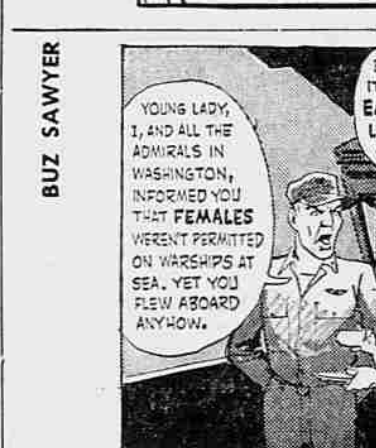

thalmologists whom I have questioned on this point said that usually they see no need for removing the cataract from the bad eye; the person already has good vision for all his needs. And furthermore, when the cataract is removed from the poor eye, he may not be able to use his two eyes together. The images coming to the brain from the two eyes may be so different in size that they cannot be fused easily.

Question May Arise

After the operation the person generally is made to lie quietly for 10 days or so, with the eye bandaged so that he cannot use it. Then he gets his new glasses and after that, if the result is good and he has been given good vision, he can use his eye just as he ever did before. Then the question may arise, should he have the cataract removed from the other eye. Again he must be guided by the advice of his ophthalmologist. The decision may depend on how old the person is; what seri-

ous illnesses he has, and how badly he needs good stereoscopic vision, such as comes from the use of both eyes. Many an old man or woman, who never did read much, needs only enough vision so that he or she can get about in the house. For this, fair vision in one eye is enough. With all the reading and writing that I do, I would want to get the best possible vision, and hence, if I had cataracts, I would probably have both eyes operated on.

Similarly, a mechanic or car-

ter would want to have vision in both eyes so that he could estimate short distances correctly.

I remember well one of the first patients I had when I opened my first office. He was a young blacksmith who, because of a flying chip of steel, lost one eye. He had to give up his work because he could no longer estimate correctly short distances on a glowing bar of steel.

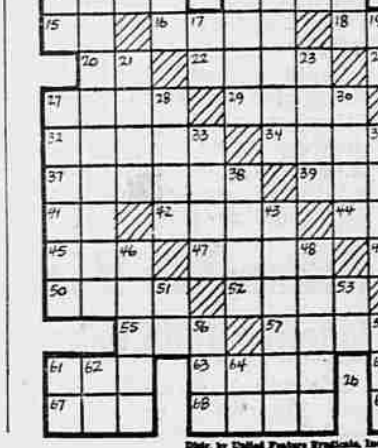
