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Winter Makes Pass at Oregon

Old man winter made an unseasonal return to Oregon today. Snow flurries fell in heights around Portland and below-freezing temperatures were reported in eastern Oregon.

Besides that, a new storm system was heading south from the Aleutians and was expected to bring more rain to the state by tomorrow afternoon, the weather bureau said.

Snow mixed with rain also was reported at Salem and Roseburg this morning. Downtown Portland had cold showers.

Temperatures this morning dipped to 26 at Lakeview, 28 at Redmond, 29 at Burns and 32 at Baker. Roseburg had 33 and Medford 34 in western Oregon. Heaviest precipitation in the 24 hours ending at 4:30 a.m. was .85 of an inch at North Bend.

Streams continued to rise slightly. The Columbia at Vancouver was at 10.9 feet, 4.1 feet under flood stage. The Santiam at Jefferson was 10.5 feet, 2.5 feet under flood stage. The Willamette in Portland was 6.2 feet under the flood mark but upstream at Albany was 7.4 feet, more than 12 feet below the flood level.

Communist Band Kills Policeman in Brazil

Soviet Police Chief Curbs British Visit

London — (U.P.) — Soviet Secret Police Chief Ivan Serov is cutting short his visit to Britain because of violent protests against his coming here, it was reported today.

London newspapers greeted Serov with cries of "butcher" and "odious thug" on his arrival here to check security arrangements for the visit of Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Communist leader Nikita S. Khrushchev.

He had planned to remain in London until they arrive next month but has decided to leave early so British public opinion can calm down before his boss arrive, reliable sources reported.

Former Soviet Premier Georgi Malenkov, has decided to cut short his visit to the north of England and will return here Wednesday, Soviet sources said. It was believed he would confer with Serov before the police boss leaves for Moscow.

SP Train Derailed On Eugene-Coos Line

Eugene — (U.P.) — An engine and five freight cars of a Southern Pacific freight train were derailed near Nekoma about 46 miles west of here on the Eugene-Coos Bay branch early today after a big boulder knocked out about 150 feet of track.

No one was hurt.

Southern Pacific officials said the engine and three cars remained upright and that two freight cars were on their sides. A relief train was sent from Eugene and was expected to take 10 to 12 hours to clear up the wreckage.

Salem Council Will Discuss Transit Curb

Salem — (U.P.) — The Salem city council tonight will study a proposed ordinance which would permit city transit lines to curtail night bus service.

The bus line has asked to suspend most night bus schedules due to decreasing patronage and financial losses.

The council also will hear a resolution from the Salem Junior Chamber of Commerce asking that immediate steps be taken to alleviate offensive odors from the Kraft paper plant near Albany.
