Dates for YMCA Camp At Diamond Lake Are Announced At Meet

The Klamath Falls camp for boys will be between July 8 and 22; Medford and Ashland, July 22 to 29; two-week period for Medford, Ashland and Roseburg boys, July 29 to Aug. 12; one-week period for Medford and Roseburg girls, Aug. 12 to 19; Medford girls, Aug. 19 to 26; and family camping, Aug. 26 to Sept. 3.

Cy Radcliffe Claims NLRB Action 'Padded for Labor'

Cy Radcliffe, who believes that the treatment he has received from officials of the National Labor Relations board proves that the board's actions are "padded for labor," spoke last night for a meeting of Rogue Valley Knife and Fork club at Rogue Valley Country club.

Radcliffe, owner of the Homedale Tractor and Implement company in Idaho, charged that his firm received "biased, prejudiced and unfair" treatment at the hands of NLRB staff members. He provided material from his firm records and from various board and congressional hearings to back up his statements.

The speaker, who was charged with violation of the Taft-Hartley Act in that he dismissed three employees because of union activities, related a history of the case in detail.

Charges By Radcliffe
Radcliffe charges in turn that: The government official sent to investigate the case never talked to any of his loyal employees, never entered the establishment, and never talked to the management; that when an election was held to determine whether the employees wanted to unionize, the secret ballot was violated when a government official challenged votes and forced employees to sign their names to envelopes containing their "secret" ballots.

After pointing out that the board provides its own "judge" for the hearings, Radcliffe related details of his own hearing and said that the transcript contains no evidence or testimony for management, only that provided by the union side.

Radcliffe then said the examiner's decision was given in favor of the union, even though the written report of the decision states there was no evidence but that the "demeanor" of the two business owners at the hearing was such that the examiner believed them guilty.

History Related
The speaker then related the history of the tractor company's various unsuccessful appeals, his subsequent appearances before senate and house committees investigating labor conditions, and details of a congressional hearing held in Homedale. At that time the examiner who had presided over the company-union hearing refused to answer questions put by the congressmen under orders from his superiors, Radcliffe declared.

"I have been judged guilty of violating the laws of my country although never once have I been permitted to take the stand in my own defense, nor has a witness of my choosing testified in my behalf," Radcliffe declared.

The speaker told how the Homedale case attracted attention throughout the nation and said that hundreds of persons had voluntarily contributed money, mostly small sums, to help him continue his legal battle with the NLRB. These monies were handled by a group of men in Homedale known as the Kiwanis Legal committee, he said.

Destinies Being Shaped
During his talk Radcliffe said "our destinies are being shaped by officials answerable not to us or congress, but only to their bosses." In closing he urged his

listeners to continue to fight for their freedoms and "to speak up and talk about government." He recited a portion of the Declaration of Independence and declared that coming generations will have fewer freedoms unless present citizens are watchful.

The speaker was introduced by Eric Allen Jr., club president. The final meeting of the year will be held April 30.
