

## Eagle Point Grange Sets Old Fashioned Get-Acquainted Night

Eagle Point—An old fashioned election rally and candidates get-acquainted night, completed with costumes and a torchlight parade, will be held here next Tuesday, April 3, it was announced yesterday.

The event, which is expected to be the "kick-off" of the primary election campaign for county candidates, is being sponsored by the Eagle Point Grange. The entire population of the county is invited.

**Regular Meeting**

The rally is being built around the regular Grange meeting, which will start at 8 p.m. Detailed plans are being formulated, and will be announced as they become definite.

Candidates for election to county and state offices in the primary election are all invited, and are requested to come dressed in costumes of the 1890s or

earlier. Or "Farmer clothes" will do, the committee said, if old-time costumes are unavailable. The committee said the candidate with the best costume "will receive 100 votes"—although it did not specify what kind of votes.

**Grange Lecturer**

C. C. Hoover, lecturer of the Grange, is chairman of the rally. Ex-Sheriff Ralph Jennings will attend to enforce law and order. Vernie Matthews and Bill Bingham will be in charge of the "hitching rack," and Earl Jossy and Bill Wattenberg are in charge of the torchlight parade.

Holly Swingle will be the greeter. There will be an election-queen contest and there will be old-time fiddling by Ed Cowden accompanied by Mabel Wertz. There will be group singing led by Mr. and Mrs. Ed Gore, and early-day football heroes will attend.

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## American Tanks Being Unloaded At Arabian Port

Bahrain, Persian Gulf—(U.P.)—Eighteen American-built Walker Bulldog tanks have reached Saudi Arabia aboard an American ship and are being unloaded at the Saudi Arabian port of Dammam, it was reported here today.

Reports reaching this British protectorate from the nearby mainland said the U.S. freighter James Monroe arrived in Dammam yesterday with the tanks on deck, their steel treads stowed on top of them.

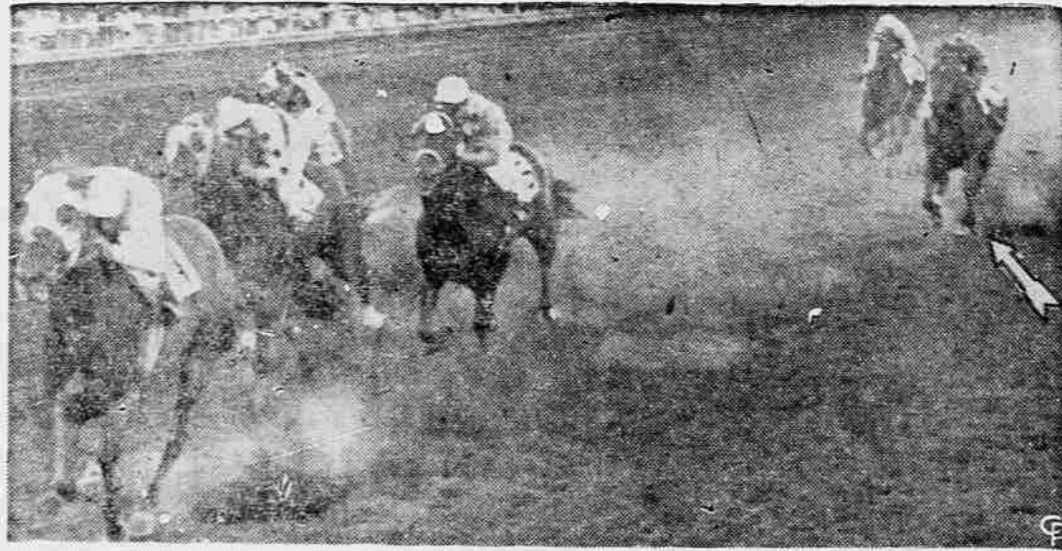
No special security arrangements were taken, but Saudi Arabian authorities gave the controversial tank shipment special priority over other shipping.

**For Training Purposes**

The tanks were shipped to Saudi Arabia for training purposes over the objections of the Israeli government which has been unsuccessful in efforts to buy arms from the United States.

Saudi Arabia purchased the tanks from the United States last Aug. 25 under an agreement whereby the United States agreed to supply training tanks in return for certain rights including the use of air bases in Saudi Arabia.

The tank purchase was made before Soviet Russia caused unrest in the Middle East by arranging for Communist Czechoslovakia to sell MIG15 jets, Soviet-built bombers, tanks and heavy guns and other equipment to Egypt.
