

# Tony Trabert Brings Formidable Amateur Tennis Record In Appearance Here May 28

Tony Trabert, world amateur champion who will appear here on May 28 when Jack Kramer's World Championship Tennis Tour plays at Hedrick Junior high school gym, has compiled one of the greatest records ever produced by an amateur. For those who are skeptical, take a look at the record.

Tony is an example of the American big game, and this year's tour has proven it is easy for him to make the adjustment to the indoor situation. He is what tennis fans would call a "shot maker;" he has a big serve, a wonderful backhand volley and a variety of passing shots. He has a knack of adjusting his game to any surface or condition. In 1955 he was able to win the national titles on wood, clay, grass and concrete, and has found no problem in adapting his game to canvas.

In his Medford appearance, which is sponsored by the Medford Lions club, Tony will clash with the great Pancho Gonzales. The match will be part of their cross-country series for a \$25,000 contract bonus.

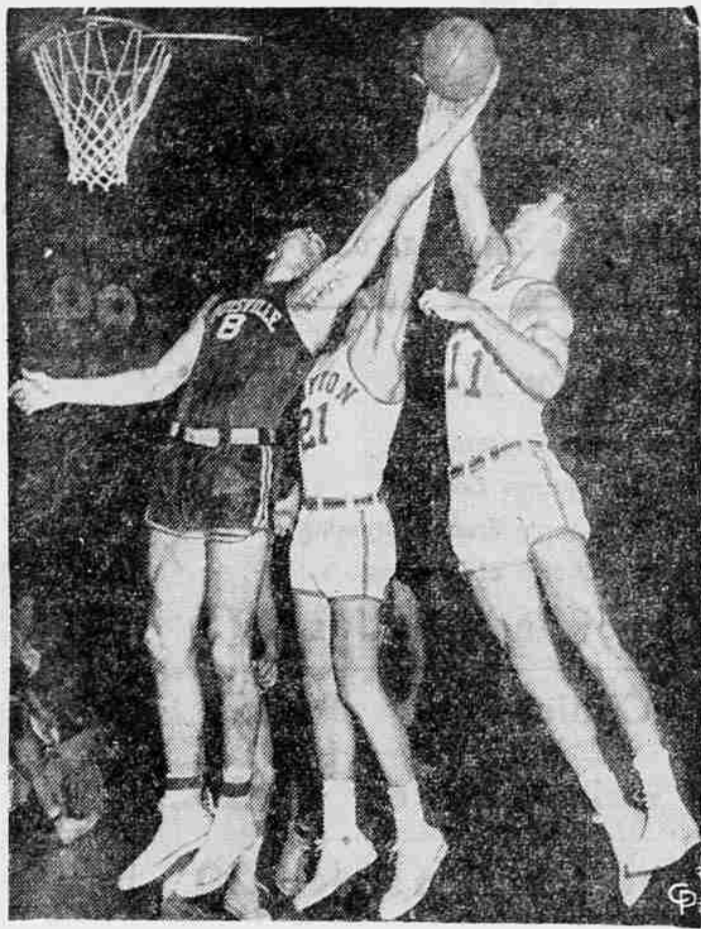

Portland — (U.P.) — Promoter Harry Glickman said today he feels that big-time pro basketball is almost a certainty for Portland within the next two years.

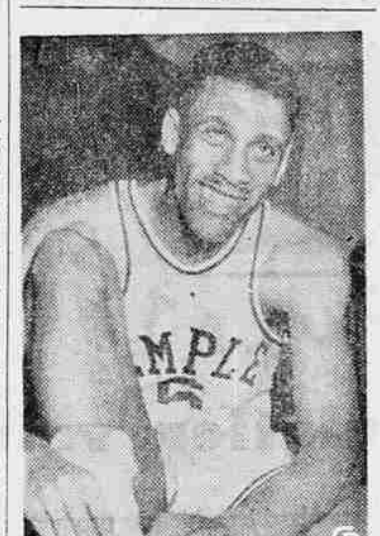
Glickman just returned from a trip to Los Angeles where he made arrangements with officials there to make joint application for National Basketball association franchises with Portland.

## Danny Schmidt Recuperating

Redding, Calif. — (U.P.) — Former Airman Daniel Schmidt celebrated his 24th birthday quietly today while recuperating from an operation undergone during three years in a Red Chinese dungeon.

Schmidt, released last August by the Reds to return home where he found himself a later-day "Enoch Arden," was hospitalized a month ago at San Francisco Veterans hospital.

His wife, Una, said Schmidt suffered complications from an appendectomy performed by the Reds during his imprisonment. Schmidt was captured by the Reds in January, 1953, when his plane crashed in North Korea.

After three years in a Red dungeon on "spy" charges he returned home to find his 23-year-old wife living with a lumberjack she said she had married in the belief Schmidt was dead. The case was likened to the "Enoch Arden" epic poem of Lord Tennyson, in which Arden returned home after being shipwrecked 10 years to find his wife remarried.

Una subsequently returned to Schmidt and they went on a second honeymoon. The lumberjack, Alford Fine, 21, married a Redding girl last December.

Schmidt planned to return to work at a plywood plant 10 miles south of here next week. Una has been working at a soda fountain here.

Una said they are quite happy.

**Hearing on Fight Fix Enters Eighth Day**

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — State investigators today examined the "Little Black Book" of matchmaker Babe McCoy, charged in testimony with "fixing" fights, splitting boxers' purses, and arbitrarily appointing managers.

**House Gives Blessing To Colorado Project**

Washington — (U.P.) — The House gave semifinal congressional approval today to a bill to authorize the \$760,000,000 Upper Colorado Reclamation project.

Senate approval was expected to follow quickly. That would send the bill to President Eisenhower, who has endorsed the project.

House action was on a conference report drafted by a Senate-House committee to reconcile differences between authorization bills passed by the two houses. No record vote was taken in the House.

The bill authorizes construction of four major dams on the Colorado river and its tributaries. The major dams are Glen canyon on the Arizona-Utah border, Flaming gorge and Curecanti in Colorado and Navajo in New Mexico.

Curecanti could be built only after a finding of feasibility by the secretary of interior.

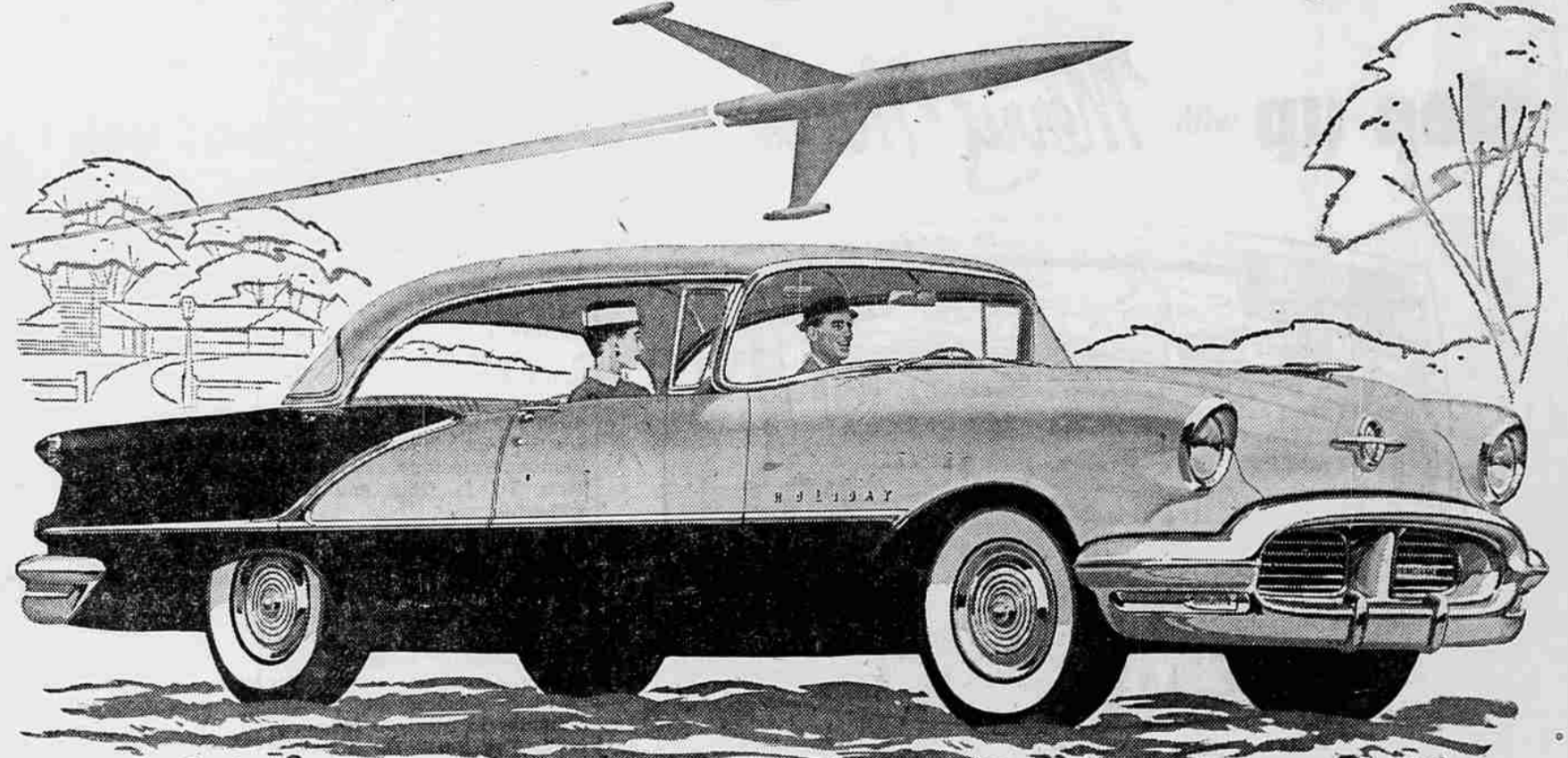

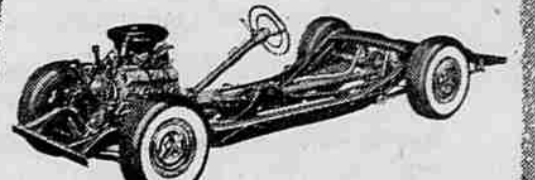
