

## Italian Educator Schedules Visit To Medford Area

An Italian political leader and educator, Dr. Luigi Rebuzzini, will spend most of a week in Medford in mid-April, it was reported today.

Mark, A. Goldy, Medford businessman who has been active in international exchange activities, is coordinating plans for Dr. Rebuzzini's visit.

According to present plans, the Italian will arrive here Wednesday, April 11, and leave the following Tuesday, April 17. He is director of the Democratic Political school of Milan, and is on a tour of the United States. Medford was selected as a stop because he wished to become acquainted with a smaller community, and because the Governmental Affairs Institute, of Washington, which is in charge of his trip, had heard of the hospitality previously accorded other foreign visitors here.

Goldy said today he would be glad to receive suggestions about an itinerary for Dr. Rebuzzini, and to hear from those who could undertake part of his entertainment. The visitor will be accompanied by a state department interpreter, although he has a limited command of English.

His visit here is part of the foreign leader exchange program of the international educational exchange service of the state department.

## Brazil Fights Illegal Shipment of Automobiles

Rio De Janeiro — (U.P.) — Brazil may open consulates in every U.S. port as part of its drive against illegal shipments of cars to this country, foreign ministry sources said Monday.

Almost 550 motor vehicles were said to have arrived illegally so far this year. Brazil is fighting the imports on grounds they are draining foreign exchange for a non-essential commodity.

## Voters Have Choice, Hitchcock Declares

Eugene — (U.P.) — "I feel most strongly that the Republican voters of Oregon have the right to make their own free choice on who will be the candidate in the general election," senatorial aspirant Philip Hitchcock said here Monday.

The ex-state senator who is seeking the Republican nomination for the post now held by Democrat Wayne Morse, addressed a group of Lane county Republican Central Committee members here last night. In the May 18 primary Hitchcock faces Interior Secretary Douglas McKay, Canby Dairymen Elmer Deetz and Portland Civil Engineer George Altwater.

## Portland Minister Fined for Assault

Portland — (U.P.) — Rev. Elbert D. Riddick has been fined \$50 following his conviction of assault and battery in Circuit Court last week. He said he would seek a new trial. The penalty was the same as that assessed by Municipal Court before its decision was appealed. He had been accused of striking Mrs. Lizzie Sheppard with a bamboo rake.

## Keating Reviews County Court Work At Rotary Meeting

The widely diversified duties and responsibilities of the Jackson County Court were reviewed at the Medford Rotary club meeting Tuesday by County Judge Rodney Keating.

Keating lauded the work accomplished by the newly formed county planning commission, with representation from all important communities and areas of Jackson county. The group is making progress in preparing an orderly program for county planning, with the county court participating in supervisory capacity, he said.

Probate duties should not be handled by any county court in Oregon, Keating said. These responsibilities and juvenile work call for specialized training.

**Faces Budget**  
The Court is now facing the job of working with the citizens' committee in preparing a satisfactory budget for the county, with forty-hour week and salary increases under consideration.

Jackson county's 15.79 per cent share of O and C land revenues is a "lifesaver" when it comes to the road building and

maintenance program, Keating said. The anticipated new road program for 1956 must necessarily be curtailed because of flood damage to county roads. He told Rotarians. The bridge building program, however, is progressing well, with 60 per cent of funds from the federal government, 20 per cent from the state, and 20 per cent county money.

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
