

Labine May Prove Sub For Podres

Memo to Apprentice Seaman Johnny Podres: The Brooklyn Dodgers wish you still were able to start for them but they figure things will be okay as long as Clem Labine is around.

It was Labine to the rescue again Thursday when the world champions evened their spring series with the New York Yankees at 2-2 by scoring a 10-inning, 5-4 victory. Clem closed it out without allowing a hit in three innings — reminiscent of his work in the 1955 World Series when he appeared in four games, winning one, saving another and yielding only six hits in 9 1/3 frames.

The fast-moving St. Louis Cardinals made their spring record 13-7 Thursday when homers by Tom Alston and Don Blasingame helped them score an 8-6 victory over the Phillies.

The Chicago White Sox, top American League team in citrus competition with a 12-6 mark, walloped 14 hits to route the Washington Senators, 12-2.

Art Ceccarelli extended his string of scoreless inning to 14 with a two-hit, seven-inning performance as the Kansas City Athletics beat the Detroit Tigers, 2-0.

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—Halfback Brad Myers and defensive end Duane Wardlow, who both played with the Rams before entering the service, have signed 1956 contracts with Los Angeles of the National Football League, the club announced today.

Myers, who played his collegiate ball at Bucknell, made the Ram squad as a rookie in 1953. Wardlow, of Washington, was a Ram regular in 1954 as a rookie. He may not be released from the service until after league play starts next season, the Rams said.

Pasadena, Calif.—(U.P.)—Former Stanford university football star Chuck Essegian had five hits, including two homers, and drove in six runs yesterday as Sacramento defeated the University of Southern California, 20-0, the worst baseball defeat in Trojan history.

Rookie left-handed pitcher Ralph Buckingham hit a bases-loaded homer for Sacramento in the fifth inning when the Solons scored nine runs. Sacramento got eight runs in the sixth.

Littler Tops Azalea Open

Wilmington, N.C.—(U.P.)—Little Gene Littler of Palm Springs, Calif., playing his best golf since his Texas Open victory, held a one-stroke lead today as a field of 150 swung into the second round of the \$12,500 Azalea Open golf tournament.

Littler fired a six-under-par 66 yesterday over the par 72, 6798-yard Cape Fear Country club course. But three other players close behind Littler as par took a beating in the first round despite slow greens left soggy by an early morning rain.

Arnold Palmer, Latrobe, Pa., former U.S. amateur champion and the top amateur here two years ago, fired a 67 to hold the lead until Littler passed him late in the day.

Tied with Palmer were five-time Canadian PGA champion Stan Leonard of Lachute, Que., and big George Bayer of Cincinnati, O.

Eight more players were grouped in a fifth-place tie with 68s, just two strokes off the pace. Teamsters Ordered To Show Picket Cause

Portland—(U.P.)—Two teamsters unions were ordered yesterday to show cause why they should not be stopped from picketing docks at Coos Bay and Portland.

The order was made by U.S. District Judge Gus J. Solomon on motions of Patrick H. Walker, Seattle, representing the National Labor Relations Board. Walker claimed the picketing, an outgrowth of a teamsters' organizational drive at Coos Bay, constituted a secondary boycott in both instances.

Defendants are local 689 of the Western Conference of Teamsters, Coos Bay, and Teamsters local 162, Portland. Judge Solomon set date for the show cause hearing for local 689 on April 9 and for local 162 on April 13.

Walker said the picketing started at the docks of the Central Dock Company in Coos Bay Feb. 6 and spread from there to Newport, Portland and Vancouver, Wash.

Gas Turbine Autos May Be Practical

Ann Arbor, Mich.—(U.P.)—A University of Michigan metallurgy professor today revealed a new development which might make gas turbine automobiles practical within "two to five years."

Dr. R. A. Flinn, head of a research team set up to search for a new, low cost process to develop a metal capable of withstanding a turbine's intense heat, said a new process of melting a nickel base alloy in a vacuum furnace has been developed.

"Actually, the alloy has the same components as metals tested earlier by the auto industry," Flinn said. "But we've found we can give the alloy the heat resistance it needs by melting it in a vacuum furnace, preventing oxygen and other gases from combining with the metal during melting."

Lumber Drying Plant Destroyed by Flames

Cottage Grove—(U.P.)—The Chemi-Dri Inc., lumber drying plant at Saginaw four miles north of here was destroyed by an explosion and fire last night with loss estimated at \$150,000.

Owner Ken Mynat of Bakersfield, Calif., said the explosion occurred about 6:40 p.m. as he and two other men were close by. No one was reported hurt.

The plant was built about a year ago. It was drying lumber for the Ricklin Lumber Co. on whose ground the plant was built but the lumber firm was saved by Cottage Grove firemen who worked until midnight to bring the blaze under control.

The drying process used cleaning solvent and foam proved more effective than water in controlling the flames.

It was not learned immediately if the plant would be rebuilt.

Western Collegians To Stage Model UN
Corvallis—(U.P.)—Students from 70 western colleges will stage a "model United Nations" next week at Oregon State college. They will debate international issues in meetings patterned after the world U.N. organization.

Each of the 70 colleges will represent a member nation of the U.N. in the four-day sessions April 4-7.

Rain on Easter Sunday Predicted

A new Pacific storm located south of the Aleutian islands may bring rain to western Oregon on Easter Sunday, the weather bureau said today.

A storm front reached the Northwest early this morning, bringing rain and showers to the region. But this front was weakening in advance of a new high pressure system approaching from the southwest.

The five-day outlook for Western Oregon called for rain again Sunday or Sunday night and for eastern Oregon showers again by Monday.

Major rivers were reported dropping slightly. The Columbia at Vancouver was down to 11.4 feet this morning which is 3.6 feet under flood stage.
