"My husband is, on the whole, a lucky gambler. He loves to play cards for money and usually wins. However, there are times when he does not and then he loses all his week's pay and goes into debt. He insists that he cannot stop until he runs out of what he calls his 'streak of bad luck'."

"The same is true of betting on horses. Sometimes he has a run of good luck and brings home a lot of money. At other times, luck is against him and he literally loses the shirt off his back."

"When he is having good luck, he is extravagant and buys all kinds of expensive things for himself, for me and the children, and for the house. Then, when his luck is against him, we literally go hungry for days. I feel that this is no security for the children and it is making nervous wreck out of me. How can I convince my husband that a married man cannot afford to gamble?"

(A) Gambling is a form of mental disease, just as drinking and over-eating are. It comes from some hidden feeling of personal inadequacy which a gambler is trying to compensate for by the excitement and occasional successes gambling brings.

Your husband needs professional help to cure him of his gambling, just as alcoholics do. Members of the family rarely can make any headway at all with their attempts to reform such people. I suggest that you discuss this problem with your

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Tragedy Avoided as Cruiser Tips on Side

Miami—(U.P.)—A group of merry-making hotel employees narrowly missed tragedy Tuesday when their sight-seeing cruiser slipped on its side, dumping nine persons into choppy Biscayne Bay.

The Coast Guard reported no persons were missing. Five women and a man picked out of the water were treated for shock and exposure but apparently were not seriously hurt.

The 47 persons left aboard the listing craft were gripped with panic as they clung to the sloping decks, Capt. A. W. Wood reported.

"How the boat kept from going under all the way, I don't know," he said. Quick action by the crew of a nearby fishing craft probably saved the lives of some of the nine floundering in the water.

Committee Refuses Discontinuation of Voters' Pamphlet

Salem—(U.P.)—The legislative interim committee on elections has refused a suggestion of its research staff that the voters' pamphlet be discontinued as too expensive and more misleading than helpful to voters.

Committee members felt that the pamphlet was valuable as "poor man's publicity" and was useful as a guide to last minute voters.

However, a realistic review of the costs per page to candidates for space in the pamphlet was called for by the committee along with an investigation of how many pages a candidate or groups representing them should be entitled to.

At present, state senators and representatives pay \$10 a page, delegates pay \$50 and most candidates for state-wide office are charged \$100 per page.

The committee also discussed a recommendation from its research staff that the pamphlet should be distributed to each household rather than to each registered voter.

No final action was taken on the proposal which would save the state some \$25,000 each election year by reducing by 35 per cent the number of pamphlets required.

The committee, headed by Sen. Pat Loneragan of Portland, said 25 per cent of the pamphlets now mailed to every registered voter are undeliverable.

Garden Notes

Many of our nut trees are used for shade, ornament and fruit. One of the most satisfactory for this purpose is the almond. It makes a small to medium tree and is in full bloom at the present time. The big drawback to almonds in this respect is that many of the trees bear very light crops. This light cropping results from poor climatic adaptation and a lack of pollination.

The filbert is another nut tree that is commonly used, and, like the almond, these trees also require a pollinating variety. The big drawback to the filbert is its susceptibility to aphid attack.

Walnut Common
The walnut is very commonly planted and while it is subject to aphid attack, it is not too bad from this standpoint. The big drawback to walnuts is that our soils are shallow and after the trees reach fair size, they lose their vigor and dead twigs appear throughout the trees. So long as a walnut is not planted where its loss would be a serious blow from the standpoint of shade or decoration, it is a satisfactory tree.

Hickory nuts seem to do fairly well here, but there are very few of them. They do mature nuts in this area.

Chestnuts and pecans are not widely planted because while they are fine shade tree specimens, the pecans never mature fruit and only a few of the chestnuts mature good fruit. A new variety of pecan has been announced which is supposed to mature nuts in most of the northern areas where deciduous fruits are grown. This would certainly include the Medford area if the advertising is accurate. Arrangements have been made with the college to obtain a small amount of bud wood of this new variety. Anyone having a pecan tree that would like to have some of this new variety grafted on to it, should contact us and in so far as we get enough bud wood, we will be glad to graft in this new variety for trial. If interested, please contact us at once as the grafting season will soon be here.

Detroit Milk Prices Raised as Farmers Make Victory Claim

Detroit—(U.P.)—Dairy farmers pointed today to a cent and one-half per quart price increase for milk and claimed at least a partial victory in their nine-day strike for higher prices.

Their attempt to choke off the milk supply of the nation's fifth largest city ended Tuesday when a series of court injunctions and armed police convoys smashed their blockade.

Realized Objectives

Homer Martin, adviser to the Fair Share Bargaining association, (FSBA) which started the strike, March 26, said the group accomplished "in a large measure," its objectives.

"The milk producers of Michigan are receiving a fairer share for their farm efforts than they were before our association was formed and started action to achieve that end," Martin said.

The FSBA was formed as a splinter group of the parent Michigan Milk Producers association (MMPA). It originally demanded \$6.50 per hundred-weight for milk, then scaled its demands down to \$6 and finally to \$5.50 as the strike wore on.

The MMPA which represents 12,600 farmers who supply 90 per cent of Detroit's milk, threatened to join the fight but then came to terms with creameries for a price of \$5 per hundred-weight. The old price was \$4.41.

Rationing Planned

The FSBA claimed at one time during the strike that it had shut off 90 per cent of Detroit's milk supply. City and state health authorities laid plans for emergency rationing but abandoned them when the flow of milk resumed.

Creamery officials estimated it would take at least until Thursday to fully restore the milk supply. They said deliveries returned to about 75 per cent of normal Tuesday when police-escorted tankers entered the city and other tankers came in from Wisconsin, Ohio and Indiana.

The FSBA adviser said the end of the strike did not mean the end of the group's efforts to obtain a larger share of the price of milk sold at retail.

Eggs of Mosquito Extracted From Soil

Campaign, Ill.—(U.P.)—Finding the proverbial needle in a haystack would be easy for the University of Illinois' entomology department. It has perfected a system of extracting mosquito eggs from the soil.

Prof. William R. Horsfall said the feat might be compared to sorting soot from a coal pile. Horsfall and several graduate students developed the "Illinois Mosquito Egg Extractor." The separator washes a sample of soil through a series of fine-meshed screens until only the eggs and waste of similar size remain trapped.

The residue is put into a salt water solution and the eggs rise to the top. Each egg is individually counted and identified by species according to the pattern on the egg.

Horsfall said the machine is of particular importance because eggs may lie dormant on dry soil for up to a year and then hatch after being submerged in water.
