### New Orleans Symphony Tours Latin America

Havana, Cuba—(U.P.)—The New Orleans Symphony Orchestra Tuesday presented the first of 29 concerts scheduled in 16 countries throughout the Western Hemisphere.

The 83-member orchestra, directed by Alexander Hilsberg, is the first such group to tour Latin America under the auspices of the U. S. State Department.
