Tokyo, with JAL—We were sitting around a low table in a Japanese teahouse noted for its tender, tasty beef, served in a dozen ways, all good.

To achieve its perfection, I was told the supplier kept each animal stalled—to prevent muscle-building exercise; he gave it Japanese beer with the grain to keep it relaxed; and as a final flip, had it massaged daily, to rub the fat into the meat.

Our meal, graciously served by two kneeling waitresses, had progressed to the tenth course. My host, Tony Senda, the worldwide public relations director for Japan Air Lines, asked: "I'm curious. Being a naturalist, what are you going to write for the Asahi Journal? This is Japan?"

To my shrug, he prompted: "Well, now that you have been here five weeks and wiped some of the star-dust out of your eyes, what do you like best?"

"Since I love the outdoors, the whole of Japan grows on me," I said.

"Take this teahouse. Like most teahouses in Tokyo, even crowded as this city of 8,000,000 is,

you'll see rot room enough for these beautiful hidden-away gardens. These islands of retreat in a busy city . . .

"Or Kyoto. The agelessness of its beauty. The modernity, too, of its wooden architecture, the gardens so carefully kept yet projecting the imagination into the greater outdoors.

"The express ride to Nikko. I took a book along to while away the hours and didn't crack it. The countryside was altogether too lovely. Extracting the maximum from every square foot, like plotted gardens. Every tree beautifully pruned—entire apple orchards with every limb disciplined . . .

Tony nodded agreement. "Go on, I love to hear it . . ."

Kelso Men Drown In Cowlitz River

Kelso, Wash.—(U.P.)—Two Kelso men drowned in the Cowlitz river here Saturday afternoon when one of the pair slipped into the stream and the other jumped in after him in a futile rescue attempt.

Cowlitz county sheriff Merle Devins reported that Floyd Clark, about 46, and Wayne P. Baker, 35, were working on a float house near the west end of the old Cowlitz river bridge here. A plank gave way under Baker, plunging him into the stream. Clark dove in to save his brother-in-law, observers said, and both men were swept away by the strong river current.

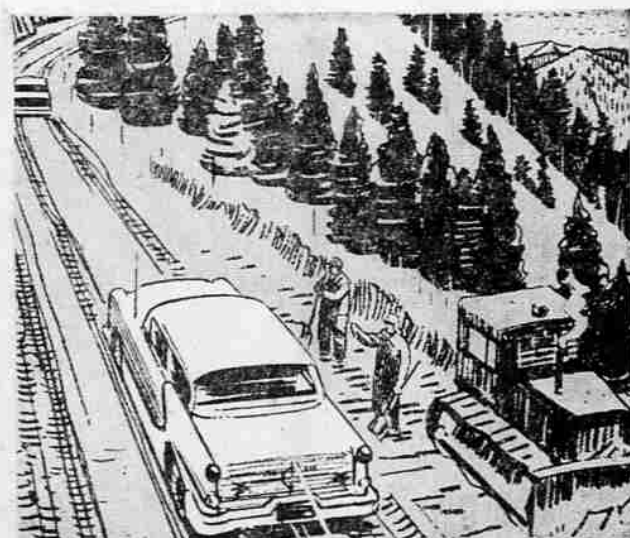

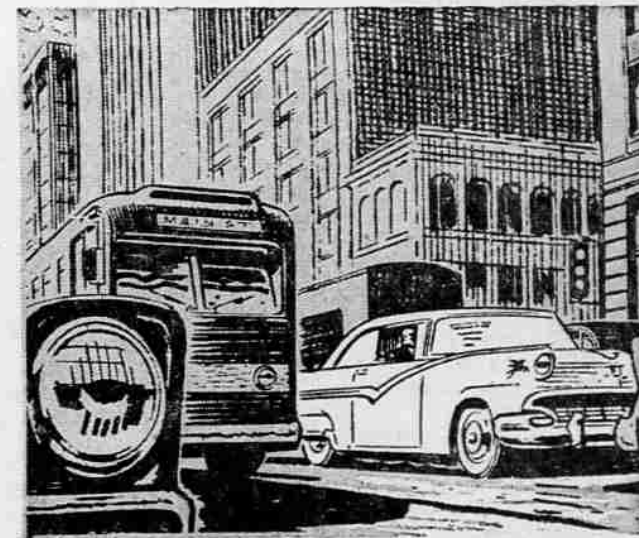
