Many Veterans Said Able To Pay Bills

Washington—(U.P.)—The House Veterans Committee indicated today at least 20 per cent of the veterans seeking free government hospitalization for non-service connected liabilities can afford to pay.

As an example, the committee said a retired construction engineer who was a veteran of the Spanish-American War with a \$101 a month pension received 25 days of free hospitalization on the basis of his inability to pay.

But the investigation showed he had an annual income of \$21,719 and was worth \$507,670.

Man Hospitalized In Suicide Attempt

Edwin Warner Cross, 52, of 1375 Stewart ave., was reported in satisfactory condition today at Community hospital where he was taken Sunday morning after shooting himself in the right cheek with a 20 gauge shotgun.

Authorities reported Cross attempted to commit suicide at about 10:30 a.m. Sunday, after driving to the junction of Table Rock and Antelope rds. State police received a call from the Forest Green agency about five minutes after the shot was fired. The caller said the wounded man had been found on the highway.

Medford ambulance and the sheriff's office were notified and Cross was taken to the hospital. The blast reportedly tore the flesh from his jawbone. He was kept under police surveillance overnight. He is expected to remain in the hospital for at least five days.

Anti-Racket Crusader Faces Critical Period

New York—(U.P.)—Labor columnist Victor Riesel, temporarily blinded by acid thrown by a thug, today faced the "critical period" in the battle to save his eyesight.

Riesel opened his eyes without assistance for the first time yesterday since Thursday's sneak attack when his assailant hurled the sulphuric acid and escaped.

The crusading writer was able to see his physicians and members of his family clearly. But he was warned that the next four days are "critical" and that complications could still destroy his sight.

Gov. Averell Harriman visited Riesel's bedside a few hours after the writer had opened his eyes unaided. Harriman, wishing a speedy recovery, pledged New York state's full resources in the search for Riesel's assailant and said state and city governments were determined to wipe out mob violence.

Salt Lake City—(U.P.)—The 126th annual conference of the Latter Day Saints Church ended here yesterday afternoon with an appeal from President David O. McKay for assistance in carrying out a program for young persons who leave home for larger cities.

Ward bishops were asked to send the names of such youths to Apostles Spencer W. Kimball and Mark E. Peterson so the youths can be contacted by LDS officials in the large cities and given guidance.

Without guidance, McKay said, many young men and women get on what he called the "short broad highway to destruction." This analogy was brought out first by Apostle Harold B. Lee, who referred to a picture relating that a road leading to the Utah State Prison was the shortest designated highway in the state.

Riesel's Informants Under Police Guard

Chicago—(U.P.)—Police kept a 24-hour guard over two of columnist Victor Riesel's labor informants at the opening of the International Union of Operating Engineers convention today.

The informants, William Wilkens and Peter Batialis of New York, are members of a "reform" group seeking to rid the union of alleged racketeer influence.

They were with Riesel a short time before an unknown assailant threw acid in the labor columnist's face Thursday. Riesel has charged that the engineers' union is "racket ridden."

Wilkens charged that Joseph S. Fay, former union vice president who was recently paroled after serving eight years for extortion in New York City, is trying to win power at the convention.

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—Students from 40 Pacific Coast colleges and universities chose President Eisenhower and Adlai E. Stevenson in mock political conventions held at University of Southern California.

Representatives Friday picked President Eisenhower and Vice President Richard M. Nixon to run for reelection again in November on the Republican ballot.

The mock Democratic convention Saturday saw Stevenson and Sen. Stuart Symington of Missouri picked to run for the two highest offices in the land.

The conventions featured as speakers Sen. Thomas Kuchel (R-Calif.) and Democratic Gov. Orville L. Freeman of Minnesota.

Body of Robber Located in Swamp

Paradise, Calif.—(U.P.)—The body of a man who disappeared after robbing a Paradise nursery three months ago was found half-buried in a swamp near here yesterday.

The badly decomposed body was identified as that of Walter George Bannister, 61, San Francisco. Authorities said he once served time in Oregon State Penitentiary for murder and Washington State Penitentiary for burglary.

Bannister apparently drowned in the swamp during a storm Jan. 14 while trying to escape sheriff's deputies who had chased him and two others after they were seen burglarizing the nursery.

'Renegades' Hold Up Illegal Cock Fight

Steubenville, O.—(U.P.)—Nine bandits who acted "like a bunch of Wild West renegades" apparently made a clean getaway with loot estimated between \$20,000 and \$200,000 from an illegal cock fight held in a barn, sheriff's deputies reported today.

"It was almost funny, looking back on it," one of the 125 spectators at the cock fight related.

"They charged in like a bunch of Wild West renegades, armed to the teeth, and couple of them even wore black masks. Only the horses and sheriff's posse were missing."
