Hatchet Slayer Found Guilty

Bakersfield, Calif. — (U.P.) — Donald Wyciskala, 22, Bismarck, N. D., was found guilty yesterday of second degree murder in the hatchet slaying of a Seattle couple.

Superior Judge Normal T. Main issued the ruling at the conclusion of a one-day trial without jury. At the defendant's request, he was immediately sentenced to Chino State Prison for consecutive five years to life imprisonment terms.

The victims, Mr. and Mrs. James Askew, were killed Feb. 5 on a lonely country road near McFarland about 30 miles north of here. Wyciskala was arrested a few days later in New Orleans and admitted the slayings because Askew had "nagged" him while he was driving the couple's car.

Wyciskala originally pleaded innocent and innocent by reason of insanity to both murder counts. When the trial opened, he changed his plea in the case of Mrs. Askew to innocent by reason of insanity.

After the jurist's ruling of second degree murder, he withdrew both insanity pleas. Prior to the trial, he had been found sane by two psychiatrists.

Alaska Crashes Take Seven Lives

Anchorage, Alaska — (U.P.) — Seven persons were killed and one seriously injured in two separate plane crashes in Southwestern Alaska during the past two days.

All six persons aboard a Cordova Airlines plane died when the craft crashed Monday and a bush pilot was killed and his passenger injured when their light plane cracked up yesterday.

Search parties reached the wreckage of the Cordova plane late yesterday afternoon and reported the Aero Commander crashed at the 3000-foot level of a jagged mountain peak 72 miles south of here. The plane was on a flight from Anchorage to Seward, Alaska.

Those aboard were identified as Bruce Robertson, Seattle; Raymond Gillis, Seward; B. J. Jams, Tacoma, Wash.; D. Sayres, Seattle; pilot John Waide, Anchorage, and a military officer whose name was not immediately released.

The light plane, in which pilot Hakon Christensen was killed and E. Wells Ervin, prominent Anchorage business leader was injured, went down five miles south of Cordova. The plane was enroute to Anchorage from Seattle.
