With the divorce rate rising annually to new highs, many people are concerned about the effects of divorce on all concerned, especially the children.

(Q) "I was very much interested in a recent column of yours in which you pointed out that children are often the innocent victims of a divorce. I feel when people marry, they must take the good with the bad. There are good and bad days in every marriage and no husband or wife has a right to expect the partner to be perfect, as they themselves are not perfect. I realize children are often better off if their parents are divorced than if the home was kept together by fighting all the time. I also feel it is hard on the parents of the people who are divorced. Wouldn't you consider them 'innocent victims' also?" Mrs. R. T.



(A) I certainly would consider the parents of divorced people the "innocent victims" just as the children are. Many people of the older generation are strongly opposed to divorce and feel their children have brought disgrace to the family by going to the divorce courts to solve their marital problems. While it is true some members of the older generation have been divorced themselves, they are fewer than those who are getting divorces today. Furthermore, because divorce was even more strongly frowned upon a generation ago, those who were divorced in the past generally had more serious reasons for divorce than couples of today. Know of Hardships Even parents who have been divorced know of the complications divorce brings to a family and the hardships, both financial and emotional, it brings to all concerned. That is why they are so disturbed when their own children fail in their marriages and end them in the divorce courts. Another complication for parents of divorced people that often escapes attention is the economic burden it places on them. This is especially true of the parents of the wife. Natural-

ly they do not want to see her and their grandchildren suffer from want. So, at a time in life when they can ill afford it, often they are called upon to add this extra financial burden to their already strained budgets. (Copyright 1956, General Features Corp.)

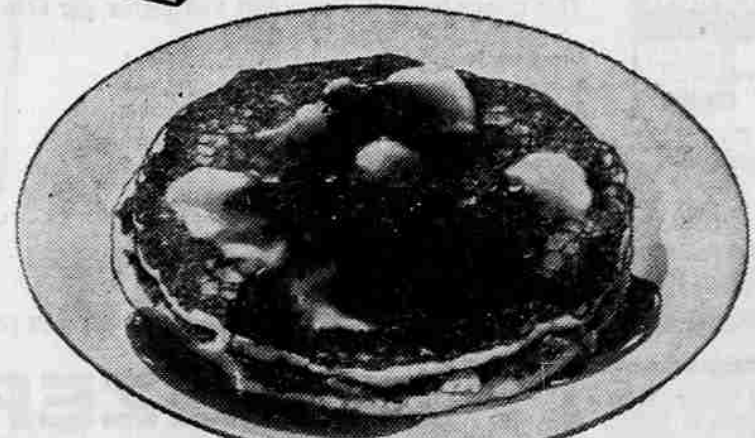

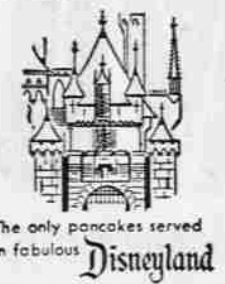
