



### Paratroopers Blown From Jump Target

Preston, Ont. — (U.P.) It poured paratroopers in Preston yesterday when wind scattered members of the airborne battalion of the Royal Canadian Regiment from their jump target.

The paratroopers jumped from a height of 1500 feet from Flying Boxcars out of London, Ont., and were to have landed in open country outside Preston.

But a gust of wind blew 47 of the men into town. They landed on roofs, became snagged in trees, knocked over television antennas and a few smashed windows as they floated to earth. The paratroopers were in full battle dress for the training exercise.

Four of the soldiers were taken to a hospital for treatment of cuts and bruises.

### Need of Rigorous Training Pointed Up

Pittsburgh — (U.P.) — Adding to Wagner, Battle Creek, Mich., national commander of the American Legion, said Wednesday night he hoped the American public would not demand abolition of rigorous training methods because of the incident at Parris Island, S.C., where six Marines lost their lives.

"War is no tea party and men must be subjected to hard training if they are to survive the actual test," Wagner told a meeting of Western Pennsylvania legionnaires.

He said he hoped "the American people will withhold judgment on the tragic Parris Island incident until all the facts are in."

### Three Diseases Added To Reportable List

Salem — Three new diseases have been added to the list of livestock diseases which veterinarians must report to the state department of agriculture, according to J. F. Short, director. Contagious ecthyma, ornithosis and mucous disease were added to 18 others previously named.

### Toledo Athletes Hurt In Truck Accident

Toledo, Ore. — (U.P.) — One member of the Toledo high school baseball team was still in the hospital here today with serious injuries as a result of a truck accident Tuesday evening that saw the entire high school team thrown to the pavement as it returned from a game at Siletz.

Most seriously hurt of the 10 players involved in the accident was Mike Service. His injuries include a broken pelvis and dislocated hip.

The other nine boys suffered only cuts, bruises and shock

when the pickup truck in which they were riding hit a slick spot on the highway and flipped over.

### Astoria Logger Dies In Woods Accident

Astoria — (U.P.) — Wayne Haakine, 51-year-old logger, was killed Tuesday when he apparently was struck by a dead snag at the logging operation where he was working.

The accident occurred at Grays River, Wash., across the Columbia river from Astoria. He was working alone at the time of the accident.

### Wooden Indians To Get New Homes

New York — (U.P.) — The wooden Indian marched out across the country again today—100 strong and painted for a party.

Half the collection of cigar store Indians and other American trade figures made by the late Rudolph F. Haffenreffer of Rhode Island was sold for a total of \$54,700. The auction was at the Parke-Bernet Galleries Wednesday for benefit of the Nargansett Brewing Co. Foundation of Providence.

Most of the Indians went to "just people"—for game rooms, front lawns, an Ohio restaurant, a Long Island newspaper lobby.

"The dealers are here all right," said one of them bitterly. "But they're not buying. It's going too high."

"I'm numb," said Haffenreffer's son as the prices mounted. A dozen figures sold for more than \$1,000; the top price was \$2,050. The lowest price was \$100, and that wasn't even an Indian, but a "sport" in the collection—An armored saint putting out a fire.

The largest single purchase—12 figures for a total of \$13,000—was reported to be destined for the Virginia Museum at Richmond.

### Macy's Employees Expect Long Strike

New York — (U.P.) — Executives of Macy's strikebound department store served notice today that they expect their labor dispute with some 8,000 union employees to be a long one.

The store's management notified some 1,500 junior executives and supervisory workers who are manning the counters and running elevators that it is hiring personnel to replace the strikers "during the emergency."

The notice asked non-union employees to send relatives and friends "who are willing to help us."

More than 1,000 pickets completely circled the one block square building Wednesday and loudly booed anyone who entered. A company spokesman said sales volume was 30 to 40 per cent off on the lower floors and even more on higher floors.

### Stevenson Backers Say Campaign Going

Chicago — (U.P.) — Adlai E. Stevenson's supporters said today the Illinois presidential primary put his campaign into high gear again, even though he came in second best.

Late returns from Tuesday's election sent President Eisenhower's GOP primary vote climbing steadily over the Stevenson Democratic total.

The President's margin climbed over the 40,000 mark as tardy returns from GOP downstate strongholds were counted. With 9,203 of the state's 9,511 precincts tallied, Mr. Eisenhower had 737-577 votes. Stevenson had 694,996, with 9,007 precincts counted.

But Stevenson got the vote of confidence he wanted from his fellow Illinois Democrats. And he clobbered a written threat organized by backers of Sen. Estes Kefauver.

It was the first time he had put his candidacy on the line in a primary since Kefauver whipped him soundly in their head-on test of strength in Minnesota.

### Morse Replies To Negligent Kansas Republican's Note

Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. Andrew F. Schoepel addressed a letter to Sen. Wayne Morse. It said "we are very anxious to elect a Republican majority in the Senate and need your opinion on the race in your state. Like you, I am interested in the election of Republicans from the President on down."

The Kansas Republican apparently had neglected to update his mailing list after the senior senator from Oregon changed his registration to Democrat in a widely-publicized switch in 1953.

Morse made his reply public. It said the Republican candidate would be handicapped by the policies of the Eisenhower administration.

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**United States Said Facing Soviet Attack**

Rutherford, N.J. — (U.P.) — Maj. Alexander R. De Seversky warned Wednesday night the United States faces the danger of a Soviet air attack in three years unless it revamps its "utterly illogical" defense system.

De Seversky, an exponent of a large air force, told students at Fairleigh Dickinson College that the Communists soon will have sufficient supersonic planes to launch an all-out attack.

De Seversky warned that Russia was developing a better air force than the United States and that the Communists already have developed "the best turbo-jet engine" in the world.
