Mrs. Hattie Salter of Prospect spent April 10 visiting at the home of Mrs. Floyd Kelley of Shady Cove.

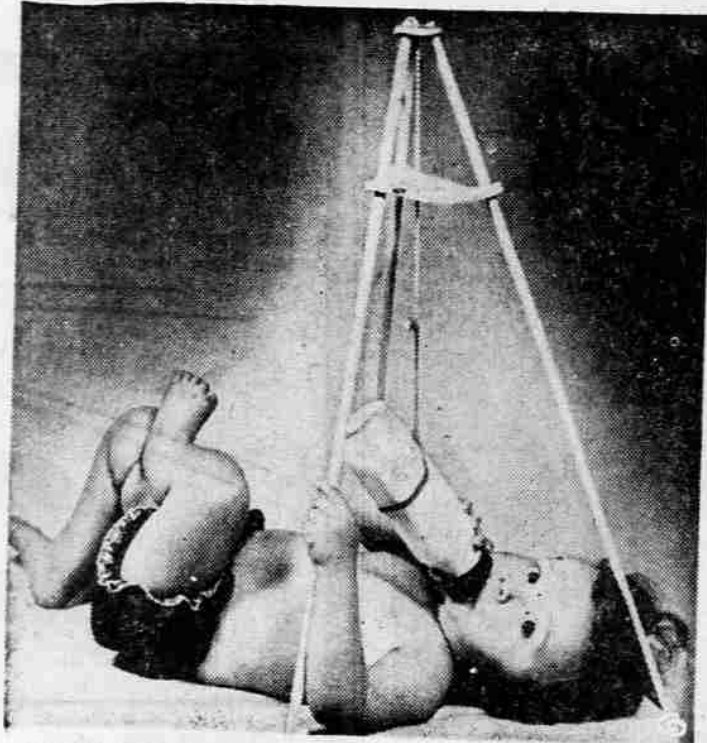

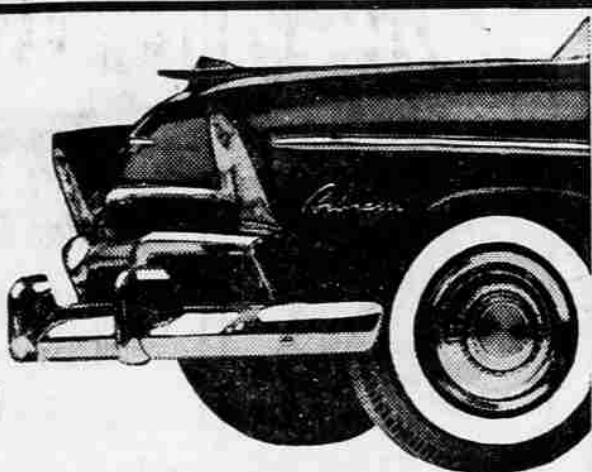
