Program Director Appointed at KYJC To Replace Nelson

Monte Morris, a staff member of radio station KYJC the past three and one-half years, has been named station program director replacing Jack Nelson, it was announced yesterday. Nelson will join the sales division as an account executive.

Morris has developed a local following on his quiz-type shows and on his early-morning and mid-morning record shows. He will supervise selection of music for all local programs in his new capacity.

Considerable Experience
Nelson, a graduate of the Northwest Broadcasting school in Portland, has had considerable experience dealing with retail merchants and as an account executive will devote most of his time to selling and servicing local advertising accounts.

He also will handle announcing assignments on the afternoon disc jockey shows. Ivan Ekberg, a ten-year radio veteran from KMPC in Hollywood, will take over early morning announcing duties. The personnel changes are in line with the KYJC policy of providing listeners with the best in local programming in addition to schedules of the CBS and ABC networks, according to James Dunlevy, manager.

Churches Called Upon To Face Problem of Maintaining Ethics

Pittsburg — (U.P.) — The churches of the nation were called upon last night to face the problem of maintaining Christian ethics in a booming economy with realism.

The call was scheduled to come when the official message of a National Study Conference on the Church and Economic Life is unveiled to the 400 delegates attending the four-day meeting sponsored by the National Council of Churches.

The delegates were expected to adopt the message at their final session on Sunday. Dr. Justin W. Nixon, Rochester, N.Y., chairman of the 25-member committee which drafted the message, said the document will delineate the relation between the nation's present record economy and the ethics of the Christian faith.

Nixon said the message would summon the nation's churches "to realistically face the problems presented by general prosperity." He said the document will speak only for the conference and not for the council of churches or its members.

Providence Reds Win Calder Cup

Cleveland — (U.P.) — Camille Henry, a 23-year-old, 132-pounder once deemed too small for the "big time," seemed certain of another trial with the New York Rangers today on the basis of his spectacular play in leading the Providence Reds to a Calder Cup triumph.

Henry, who scored 50 goals during the regular American Hockey League season, tallied four times Friday night as the Reds beat the Cleveland Barons, 6-3, and swept the championship series in four straight games.

A group of the delegates Friday urged the federal government to increase its economic aid to under-developed countries and to completely divorce it from military aims. They proposed a reduction of military spending with the savings to be used in the aid program.

Two farm experts also sharply disagreed in speeches on the omnibus farm bill now before President Eisenhower.

Charles Brannan, secretary of agriculture under President Truman, said he favored the proposed return to rigid price supports but frowned upon a soil bank provision which subsidizes non-production.

Charles B. Shuman, American Farm Bureau president, said he and the 600,000 members of the bureau were solidly opposed to the bill.

Angels Bow To Mounties

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Angelo Dagues slammed two homers and pitcher Rinold Duren struck out nine batters Saturday to lead the Vancouver Mounties to an 11-2 Pacific Coast league rout over the Los Angeles Angels. Dagues got four of the Mounties' hits off four Los Angeles hurlers. He knocked in five runs. Duren (1-0) went the distance. The Angels got only one extra base hit off the Mountie hurler — a double by Big Steve Bilko in the seventh. Angel Harry Perkowski was the loser.

Two Generals to Lead Witnesses in Hearing

Washington — (U.P.) — Chairman Stuart Symington announced Friday two top Army generals of World War II will be the leadoff witnesses when the Senate Armed Services subcommittee opens an air power study next week. The Missouri Democrat said Gen. Omar Bradley and Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, two retired generals who helped defeat Hitler's forces in Europe, will testify Monday morning.

Tommy Jackson Stops Williams

Washington, D.C. — (U.P.) — Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson proved that his word is as good as the gold he seeks in a shot at heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano. The world's second-ranked contender from Far Rockaway, N.Y., predicted he would stop former British Isles heavyweight king Johnny Williams Friday night — and that's exactly what he did. It was all over at 2:49 of the fourth round with Williams gazing up from the canvas for the third time in the scheduled 10-rounder. Jackson, who probably thinks the Marquis of Queensbury is best man at the big wedding in Monaco, sparred during the first round but then cut loose with his famous "hurricane style" and quickly had the gallant Englishman floundering all over the ring. Hurricane dropped Williams twice in the third round and then swarmed all over in the fourth.

O'Mahoney Calls Slogan Of GOP's a Delusion

Chicago — (U.P.) — Sen. Joseph O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), chairman of the Senate anti-trust committee, last night called the Republican slogan of "peace, prosperity and progress" a "delusion." O'Mahoney told a forum sponsored by the Catholic Labor Alliance that instead of peace, "we have a cold war, instead of prosperity, we have national debt."

Seals Beat Bevos 3-2

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Relief hurler Royce Lint walked pinch-hitter Gordy Windhorn with the bases full in the bottom of the ninth to force in a run and give San Francisco a 3-2 victory over Portland in a Pacific Coast league game here Saturday. A crowd of 1,549 saw a battle of strategy in the last of the ninth which started with the teams tied at 2-2. Bob di Pietro led off with a double and Tom Umphlett bunted safely to send di Pietro to third. Catcher Ed Sadowski was then purposely passed to load the bases with none out.

Portland Manager Tommy Holmes then pulled right-handed pitcher Red Adams in favor of southpaw Lint to pitch to left-hander Larry Dippio, who was batting for shortstop Jim Mahoney. Seal Manager Eddie Joost took Dippio out and put in Windhorn, who swings from the right side and Lint walked him on a 3-2 pitch to force across the winning run. Russ Kemmerer went the route for the Seals and became the first San Francisco hurler to do so in 25 games this spring. He held Portland to eight hits.

Boxing Branded Morally Evil

Chicago — (U.P.) — A Jesuit philosopher, Father Gerard Gray Grant, has branded prize-fighting as "morally evil" and promoters as "merchants of death." Father Grant, a professor of philosophy at Loyola university, said prize fighting will remain morally evil until a second foul line is established at the chin. "The merchants of death who send fighters into the ring have not yet caught up with the medical knowledge about permanent damage to the brain caused by knockout blows," he said.

Search Starts for British Actress

London — (U.P.) — Curvy Corinne Grey, one of Britain's most prominent television personalities, was reported missing Saturday. Scotland Yard said they had been asked to search for the 22-year-old actress. Miss Grey's manager, Chris Barnett, said she was to have judged a beauty contest in Oldham Friday night but never arrived. She lives here in London with her mother but there was no one in the apartment yesterday.

George Murphy to Attend Film Festival

Washington — (U.P.) — Actor George Murphy will be the official U. S. representative to the Ninth International Film festival at Cannes, France. The festival opens April 23 and runs through May 10. Thirty-four nations will participate.

Prince Asked to Stop Pigeon Shooting Event

Amsterdam — (U.P.) — The world's animal protectors Saturday asked Prince Rainier to halt the pigeon shooting which is on the program of wedding festivities in Monte Carlo next week. Pigeon shooting is a traditional event in the tiny principality. Hundreds of pigeons, whose flying ability is expressly reduced, are shot in each event. The president of the world federation for the protection of animals, Dutch lawyer W. Hugenholtz, cabled the prince Saturday asking him to stop this "cruel sport."

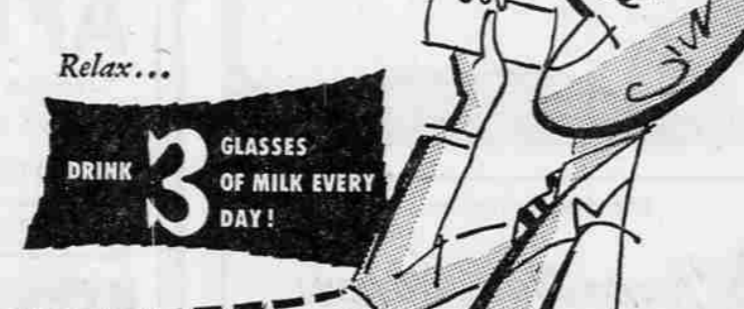
