Warren Says Terms Must Stay Synonymous
Champaign, Ill. —(U.P.)—Chief Justice Earl Warren of the United States Supreme court said today at dedication ceremonies for the University of Illinois' new law building that this country must "keep the terms law and justice synonymous."

Warren and Judge Walter C. Lindley, of the U. S. Court of Appeals at Chicago, received honorary degrees of doctor of laws as part of the dedication ceremonies.

Warren said "law and justice are not necessarily the same. Every country has law in plenty," he said, "but too many do not have justice."

'Blue Law' Supporters Complain About Visit

London —(U.P.)—Supporters of Britain's Sunday "Blue Laws" complained Saturday the current plan to present Russia's rulers to Queen Elizabeth a week from today is "a serious breach of God's commandment."

The Lord's Day Observance society said Elizabeth's scheduled meeting with Communist Boss Nikita S. Khrushchev and Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin at Windsor castle will "harm Britain's prestige."

Complications In Riesel's Condition

New York —(U.P.)—"Serious complications" have developed in the condition of labor columnist Victor Riesel, threatened with possible blindness by an acid-throwing thug's attack, doctors attending the columnist reported Friday night.

"Signs of regression" in Riesel's vision have been noted, the report said. It said more dangerous complications may develop in the next few days.

Police still are searching for the assailant who threw a vial of concentrated sulphuric acid in Riesel's face last week. The reward for the attacker has reached almost \$45,000, the New York Daily Mirror said Saturday.

The doctors said "Riesel suffered severe burns of the eyeballs and the inside of the lids and... there was evidence of deep penetration of the acid upon initial examination."

They said "today there were regrettable signs of regression in Mr. Riesel's ability to distinguish bedside visitors. It is necessary, therefore, to be cautious in offering a prognosis."

Riesel's "courage and cooperation" has greatly aided his condition, however, the doctors said.

Viet Nam Rebel Captured Saturday

Saigon —(U.P.)—"Gen." Ba Cut, shaggy-maned leader of some 1,500 fanatical pirates and cutthroats in southwest Viet Nam, was surprised and taken prisoner near Long Xuyen Saturday, the government announced.

An official announcement said Civil Guard Tommy-guns cornered and captured Cut and six of his chief lieutenants in a straw hut village at 7:30 a.m. without firing a shot.

Government sources expressed hope the capture of Cut would be followed by the surrender of other members of his faction of the Hoa Hao religious sect.

The rebel "general" who had a revolver strapped around the waist of his black, pajama-like peasant disguise, surrendered calmly and ordered his men to give themselves up.

Some of his lieutenants tried to buy their freedom with bundles of cash stolen in their raids, but the guards refused the bribes.

The prisoners were taken to the headquarters of Gen. Duong Van Minh, the Vietnamese district commander who has been battling Cut's men for the past year.

Hearings on Forming Art Commission Set

New York —(U.P.)—Sen. Herbert H. Lehman (D-N.Y.) said representatives of all major fields of art will testify at a Senate labor subcommittee hearing in New York today on a bill to establish a federal commission on the arts.

Lehman, chairman of the special subcommittee, said the witnesses will include: Lloyd Goodrich, chairman of the committee on government and art; Harold Weston, vice chairman of the national council on arts and government; Deems Taylor, music critic and composer; Robert Schnitzer, of the American National Theater academy; Robert Preston, Joseph Mankiewicz, Gilbert Miller, Clarence Duvent, John Brownlee and other producers, playwrights, and artists.

Pearson Claims Army Division Alerted

Washington —(U.P.)—Columnist Drew Pearson declared in a special column Saturday that the U. S. 2nd Armored division definitely has been alerted for shipment from Germany to the tension-charged Middle East.

The Defense and State departments earlier this week categorically denied a similar report carried in the Hartford, Conn., Times. But Pearson said his "own careful check" convinced him the alert had been ordered.

"Although it has been denied officially, and though the orders may be changed," the columnist said, "there is no question but that an alert has been sent to the 2nd Armored division in Germany to prepare to sail to Saudi Arabia in 30 days."

Asian Nuclear Center Will Be Milestone

Manila —(U.P.)—Two American scientists said Saturday the establishment of an Asian nuclear center in the Philippines will be an outstanding milestone in the global effort to prepare for the atomic future.

John F. Hogerton and Solomon H. Chafkin, members of a 10-man Brookhaven National laboratory team, said the United States will assist the British-aided Colombo Plan nations to establish a center which will:

1. Help train Asian scientists and engineers in techniques for the development of peaceful uses of atomic energy.
2. Accelerate the application of atomic techniques and equipment to help solve scientific and technological problems confronting the underdeveloped nations of the Far East.
3. Contribute to the economic development and well-being of the region.

Physicians, Patients To Appear on TV Show

Four Medford physicians and three patients will appear on a television show concerning cancer and its early detection at 5 p.m. today. Mrs. Ivan Burton will be moderator and represent the Jackson County Public Health association, which presents the bi-weekly show.

Dr. Earl L. Lawson will explain x-rays, and the cancer patients will be interviewed by Dr. Russell Barnes, medical advisor for the Jackson County Chapter of the American Cancer society, Dr. Dwight H. Findley and Dr. C. I. Drummond.

Korean Workers Schedule Walkout

Seoul —(U.P.)—The Labor Union Association said Saturday some 5,000 Korean laborers and clerks employed by the U. S. Army will strike at 1 p.m. Monday, defying government appeals and dismissal threats, unless their demand for a 100 per cent wage increase is met.

The Koreans work for the Army in Inchon and Ascom City, just west of here, which together form one of the biggest U. S. port and staging areas in Korea.

The Army has rejected the Association's wage demands, saying it does not have the funds to pay the increase. A spokesman said today that, if the Koreans strike, "we will have no choice but to discharge them."

The South Korean Health and Social Affairs Ministry has appealed to the unionists not to strike, fearing a walkout might embitter U. S.-Korean relations.
