Mrs. Roosevelt will be met at the Medford airport by a large delegation of Oregon Democrats headed by U.S. Senator Wayne Morse and Mrs. Morse.

Roosevelt Memorial Dinner Plans Complete

Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who will be guest speaker for the sixth annual Roosevelt Memorial dinner at Hedrick Junior High school here Monday evening, April 23, will arrive by plane from Fort Worth, Tex., at 5:35 p.m. that day. The dinner is set for 7 p.m.

She will be met at the Medford airport by Senator and Mrs. Wayne L. Morse, Democratic State Chairman Howard Morgan and Mrs. Morgan, Monmouth, and a delegation of upstate Democratic and state officials as well as by a local reception committee. The Medford committee will be headed by County Chairman Robert A. Boyer and other party leaders, members of Medford chapter, Oregon United Nations association, and city officials.

Senator Morse will introduce Mrs. Roosevelt at the dinner and Robert Boyer will act as master of ceremonies. The Rev. Thomas McCamant, pastor of the Congregational church, and an active member of the Medford UN chapter will give the invocation.

Following her address, which will be keyed to the memorial dinner theme but will highlight the work of the United Nations, Mrs. Roosevelt has agreed to answer questions for 10 minutes. She is famous for her rapid, on-the-spot answers to questions, but due to her difficulty in hearing from a distance, she has requested that questions be submitted briefly and in writing.

New microphones have been installed during the past week in Hedrick school auditorium that are said to greatly improve the carrying quality of sound. These, with the presence of the expected large crowd filling the gymnasium, will favor the acoustics.

Mrs. Roosevelt's talk will be the only speech at the dinner, outside of brief introductions, according to Mrs. Edward C. Kelly, general chairman.
