

Italian Professor Talks For Medford UN Chapter

"Italians have still to make our democracy the strong solid force that permeates everyday that you have in the United States," Dr. Luigi Rebuzzine, stated Thursday night to the Medford chapter of the United Nations organization.

"Our youth, although superior in many aspects to the youth of the past generations, is still sceptical and disillusioned. They have to see democracy function in the economic field to produce jobs with living wages and decent living conditions," he added.

"Italians are no different than Americans in that they, too, cannot live by bread alone, and they crave the respect and liking of their fellow man," the speaker said.

Dr. Rebuzzine went on to say that the Italian people as a whole are through with military glory and dictatorship. They have learned from history the futility of such transitory glory and the tremendous price such manifestations extract from their civilization. Now they wish to make a working democracy of their government. One of the

greatest obstacles in the way of this reform is the vast spread, both social and economic, between the ruling classes, the government functionaries and the man on the street, he added. Dr. Rebuzzine further explained how Italians hoped to remedy some of these causes of unrest by education in government, philosophy, sociology and mass psychology. He teaches all of these subjects at the University of Milan.

Dr. Rebuzzine lectured after a potluck supper, held in his honor at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harlan Bosworth Jr. When Dr. Rebuzzine finished, the regular meeting of the UN chapter took place.

Larry Solin, president of the chapter, announced that the annual UN state meeting will be held the last week end in April at Eugene and he urged all those who are interested in the functioning of the Oregon United Nations association to go.

Plans for the UN coffee hour for Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, to be held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. Reese Braley, April 24 at 9 a.m., were discussed. Only UN members will attend this coffee hour, as Mrs. Roosevelt has expressed the desire to meet the United Nations group in Medford.

Mrs. Winston will be the keynote speaker at the Washington division convention in Walla Walla April 13. She will act as consultant at the Oregon convention in Corvallis April 19-21, as luncheon speaker April 29 in Moscow, Idaho, and dinner speaker in Butte, Mont., Thursday, May 3.

Membership in the region includes the four northwestern states and Alaska with a total of nine thousand women college graduates from colleges approved by the association.

Eligibility for membership extends to present graduates of colleges in Oregon as follows: University of Oregon, Oregon State college, Reed college, Willamette university, Linfield college, Pacific university, and Lewis and Clark college, with applications received by the standards and recognitions committee from Eastern Oregon college, Southern Oregon college and Marylhurst.

To meet AAUW standards, colleges must first be approved by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher schools. The association stresses the importance of liberal content in all degrees and status of women, both student and faculty.

Those who attend should take drapery material of cotton or rayon with threads drawn and cut to size, 24 inch wide and 18 inches long; lining, either muslin or sateen, cut to 21 inches in width and 12 inches long; strip of drapery crinoline, three inches by 21 inches; matching thread; shears; pins; 2 1/4 inch needle; tape and ruler.
