Salem—(U.P.)—Eighteen children under 15 years of age were included in Oregon's 66 pedestrian traffic deaths last year, the State Traffic Safety division said Saturday.

Another 266 youngsters under 15 were injured in pedestrian accidents. Most of the accidents involving children happened when they crossed streets or darted into the road from behind parked cars.

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## State Income Tax Collections Increase

Salem—(U.P.)—Income tax collections in March were double those of March, 1955, the State Tax commission reported Saturday.

Collections in March were \$5,128,079 compared with \$2,552,071 in March of last year. Tax officials said higher tax rates were responsible for most of the increase.

In the nine months ending March 31, personal income tax collections were \$34,109,561—some \$9,000,000 more than in a similar period last year.
