Berrios Scores Win Over Bell

New York—(U.P.)—Miguel Berrios of Puerto Rico, a little guy with big plans, is moving up fast in the featherweight division.

Although unranked in the 126-pound class, Miguel scored another impressive victory Monday night when he upset veteran Bobby Bell of Youngstown, Ohio, on a split 10-round decision in their return TV bout at St. Nicholas Arena.

Rex Hartwig and Pancho Segura were tied at 10 games each when their match was stopped to allow time for other matches.

Hartwig and Trabert whipped Segura and Gonzales in the doubles match, 7-5, 6-2.

Pucinelli Dies While Playing Golf Yesterday

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Former major league outfielder George C. (Pooch) Pucinelli collapsed and died of an apparent heart seizure while playing golf at Harding Oak course yesterday. He was 48.

Pucinelli broke into professional baseball with the old San Francisco Missions of the Pacific Coast league and went up to the St. Louis Cardinals in 1930. He later played for the St. Louis Browns and retired from the Philadelphia Athletics in 1938 as the result of an injury.

He later played briefly with the Hollywood Stars of the PCL before retiring from the game a second time.

He was survived by his wife, Roma, who said he had been under treatment for heart trouble.

McMurtry Meets Matt Jackson in Portland Today

Portland — (U.P.) — Pat McMurtry, the good-looking Irishman from Tacoma, steps into the Auditorium ring here tonight to answer a question that northwest fight fans have long debated: "Can he take it?"

The young puncher who has done more than anyone to stir the boxing imagination of Portland since Harry (The Kid) Matthews, steps in tonight against Matt Jackson, an army sergeant with a dynamite laden right arm that should answer that question.

Jackson has lost only two of his 28 pro bouts.

Machen Hands Valdes Loss

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Eddie Machen, boxing around the ring like a gamecock, crashed into the big-time heavyweight picture Monday night by scoring a unanimous 10-round decision over Nino Valdes of Cuba before a wildly partisan crowd of about 6,000 at the Cow Palace.

Machen rolled up his points by scoring often from the outside with crisp left hooks to the head which often made the cumbersome dockworker from Havana blink. Machen, who now is undefeated in 13 professional fights, weighed 193, 19 pounds less than the towering Valdes.

Valdes did not begin to get untracked until the last round when he suddenly staggered his Redding, Calif., opponent with a solid left hook to the head. Machen had to hang on for the rest of the session, but by then Valdes had gotten started too late.

For the 31-year-old Valdes it was his fourth loss in his last six fights as his boxing career seemed to be near the end.

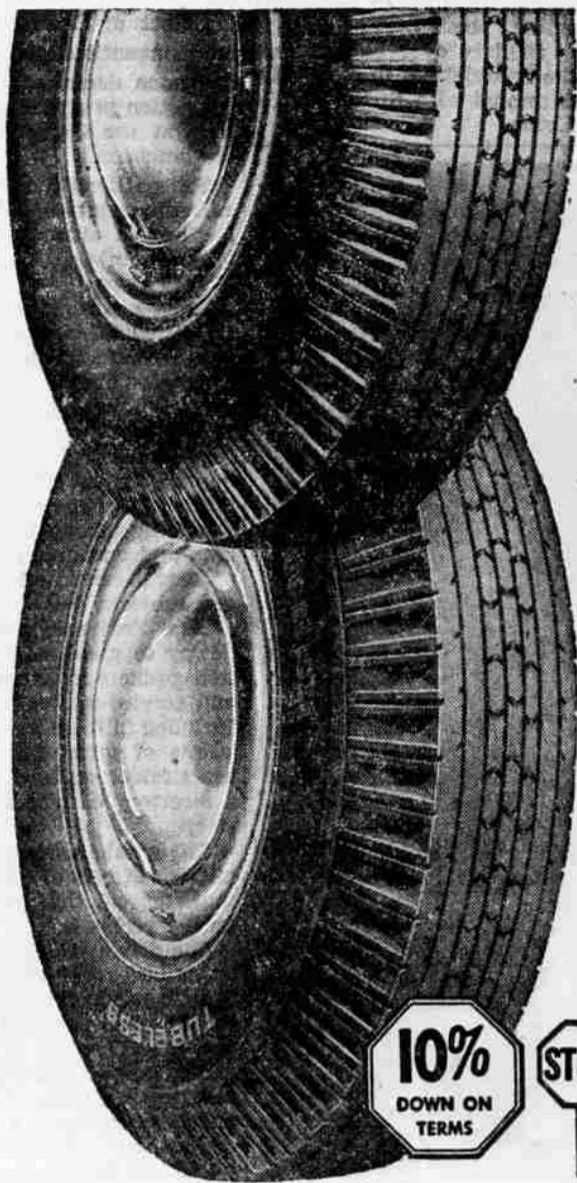

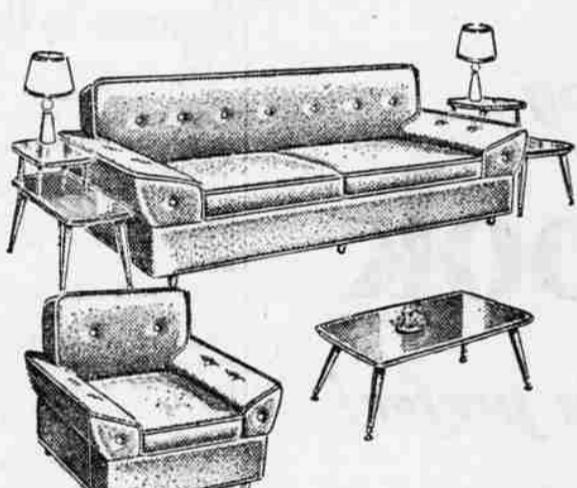

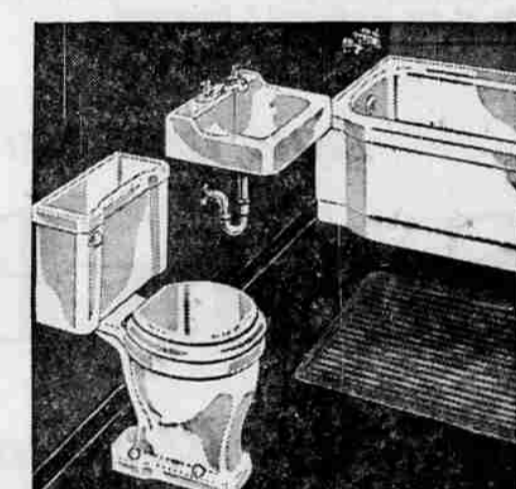
