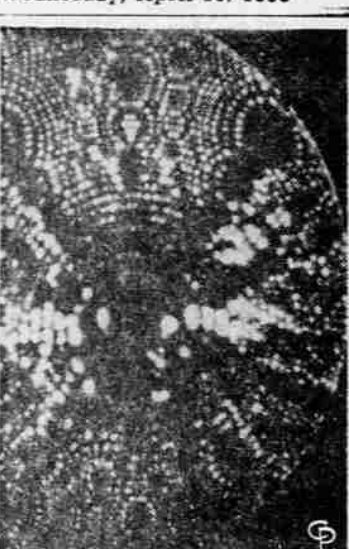

Oregon Fair Trade Act Unconstitutional

Salem — (U.P.) — The State Supreme Court in an opinion by Justice Water Toozie today held the Oregon fair trade act to be unconstitutional as it applied to nonsigners of fair trade contracts.

The high court's decision came in the case of General Electric company against Rolla H. Wahle, and affirmed Circuit Judge Eugene K. Oppenheimer of Multnomah county.

The act was held unconstitutional by a majority of the court on the grounds that it violated due process of law under the state and federal constitutions, and also that it constituted an unlawful delegation of legislative power.

Prices of Copper Expected To Decline

New York — (U.P.) — Copper prices are not likely to rise from their near record high level in 1956 and indications are they will decline somewhat near the end of the year, a leading investment management firm said today.

Calvin Bullock, in its monthly business letter, said this prediction stems from the fact that the tight supply of the critical metal is being eased by a rise in the first two months of this year in both domestic and foreign mine production and a parallel decline in foreign consumption.

Domestic mine production during this period was up 5.7 per cent over 1955, and foreign mining operations jumped 23.2 per cent during the same period this year.

Consumption on the other hand, the monthly publication said, fell by 9 per cent abroad. Domestic consumption, however, rose 23.2 per cent in those two months.

Pilot Credited With Saving 97 Lives

Hamilton, Ont. — (U.P.) — The cool headed flying skill of a U.S. Air Force pilot was credited today with saving the lives of 96 men and one woman aboard a U.S. Globemaster troop transport that made a forced belly-landing near here late yesterday.

The pilot, Capt. Jack Wofford, brought his 83-ton plane down at the Mount Hoe Royal Canadian Air Force station after two of the four engines failed on a flight from Lackbourne, O., to Harmon Field, Nfld.

Canadian Air Force officials paid glowing tribute today to Wofford for his skillful landing.
