So the Douglas county sheriff's office here is equipping its men with color cameras. Sheriff Patrick Corrigan reasons that a color photograph will clearly show how badly a victim has been cut or bruised.

Some attorneys have volunteered the opinion that in a trial, the difference between a color photograph and a black and white shot could mean the difference between conviction and acquittal.

Unander is a candidate for reelection. He is unopposed in the May 18 primary. Also at the meeting, nominations for new officers will be accepted.

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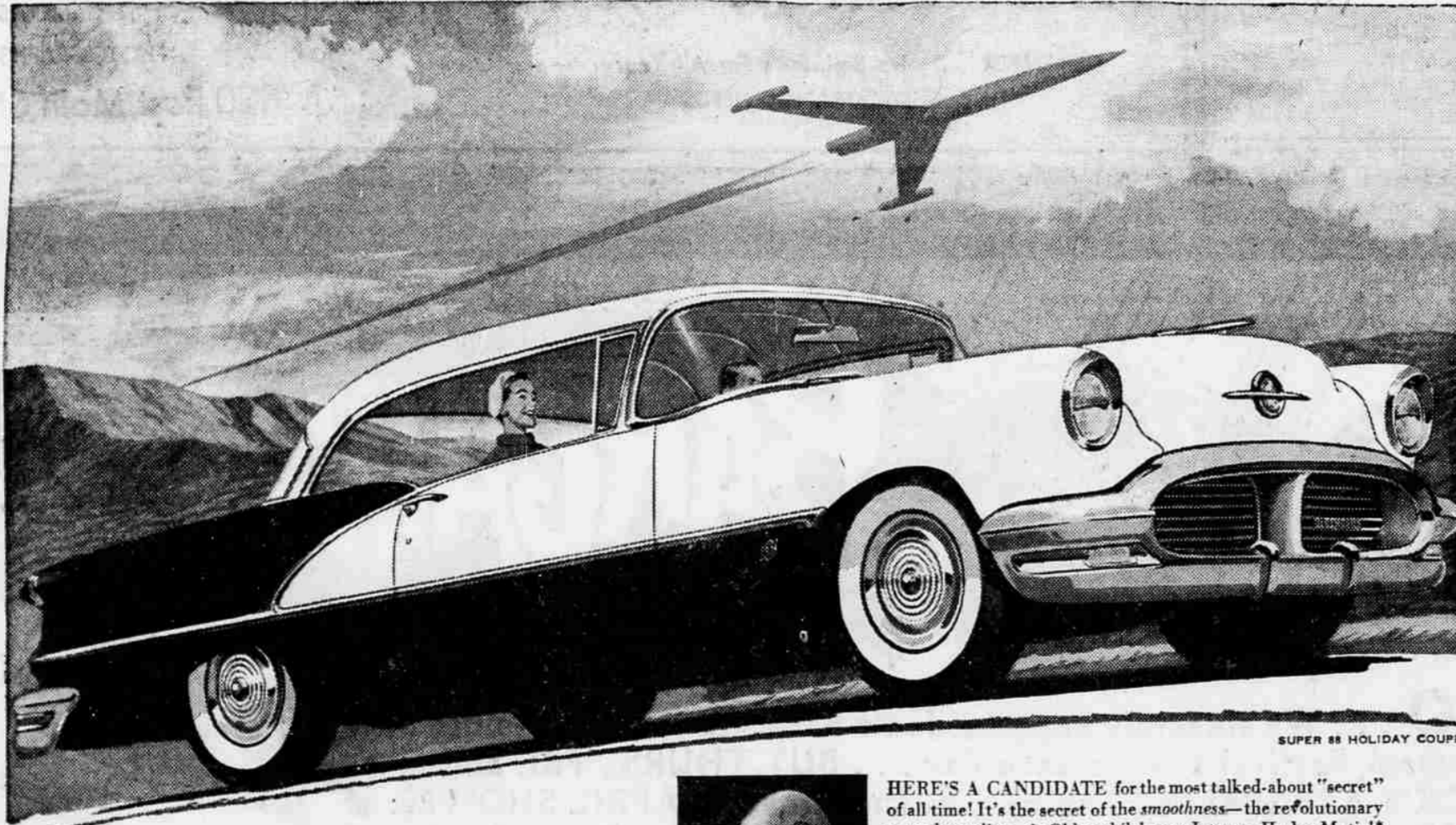

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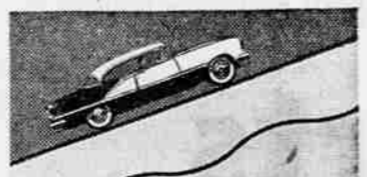
