Officers Seeking Missing Man Lead

Jackson county sheriff's deputies are looking for someone in this area who might be holding a pick-up truck and dog for Joseph Bancroft, 47, Las Vegas, Nev.

A missing persons report has been filed for Bancroft, who was scheduled to leave Nevada by plane for Medford on March 12 or 13. He was to pick up his truck and dog and join Charles E. Morton, Grants Pass, on March 18 at the Rogue Motor court in Grants Pass. The two, partners in a mining claim, planned to travel to their claim, which is believed to be somewhere in southern Oregon.

According to the sheriff's office, Morton arrived at the motor court on March 18 and waited for Bancroft until April 1. Communication with the air line office revealed Bancroft had not left Las Vegas by plane either March 12 or 13.

Bancroft is described as being 5 feet 8 inches tall, weighing 175 pounds, having a stocky build and receding hairline. Color of his hair was not known. The truck was described as a 34-ton Willys Jeep pick-up. No description of the dog was available.

Deputies have requested the party holding the truck and dog for Bancroft or anyone having information concerning the truck, dog or Bancroft to get in touch with the sheriff's office as soon as possible.
