### China Communists Looked Upon As Friends by People of Tibet

Kathmandu, India — (U.P.) — Communist China has wooed and won Tibet.

The "friends of unfair design" are now looked upon as "really good friends who have no design of any kind" on this remote mountainous country of the Dalai Lama.

The Dalai Lama's court purchaser, Tse Chuwang Gyalchen, in Kathmandu on a routine visit laden down with presents for the King of Nepal from the Dalai Lama, gave the United Press an account of Tibetan life under the Communist Chinese.

The Tensemba, as he is known, said that life in the capital, Lhasa, is not so drab as it was at the beginning of the "liberation."

"But," he said, "things are still expensive. The people have had to provide their best products to the Chinese army of 50,000, and the two main articles, milk and ghee, are now beyond the reach of the ordinary Tibetan."

"But," added the Tensemba, after the Dalai Lama's return from Peiping, "the outlook of the Tibetan towards the Chinese changed." He continued:

"China has restored all administrative powers to the Dalai Lama and he is now the all-powerful ruler of the country. The Chinese have nothing to do with the internal administration of Tibet and all the Chinese forces are engaged in the country's development and construction works.

touch with the people of Tibet and try to be very polite. The people say that within the next few years the Chinese in Tibet will be able to reach an even deeper understanding.

The Tensemba said Tibetans once refer to the Chinese as "game-me"—friends with unfair design.

"But," he added, "gradually the Tibetans are realizing that the Chinese are really good friends and have no design of any kind on their country."

"The people of Tibet are satisfied to find the Dalai Lama rules the country with all powers in hand. The Chinese do not interfere with the monasteries, and the lamas in far-away monasteries are satisfied with the Dalai Lama's present rule.

Road Progress The panchan lama, spiritual head of Tibet, does not interfere with the country's administration and relations between both lamas are very good and very cordial."

He said the Chinese have now started buying food for their troops in Tibet from either India or China, and food prices have come down—except, of course, for milk and ghee (a sort of butter).

"In Tibet we are aware of the ideological differences between China and America. We love to be free and independent without any interference from outside. We want friendship with all."

The Tensemba said the Chinese have forged ahead with de-

velopment work and have pushed the Peiping-Lhasa road through to Shigatse in western Tibet. Once a horseman took seven days to reach Shigatse from Lhasa.

"Now," he said, "it takes only two days" by car.

"The Chinese are now pushing the road towards the Tibetan-Nepal border town of Kerung. When that road is complete it will take only six days to reach the Nepalese border from Lhasa, formerly it took nearly a month to reach the border from the Tibetan capital."

## The Family Council

Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, a newspaper editor, a women's page editor and two newspaper writers. These consult with clergymen of all faiths and denominations. All letters are held in complete confidence.

STANLEY—I need my brother's ability. VIRGINIA—My husband does all the work.

STANLEY—My wife, Virginia, constantly hounds me because I refuse to quarrel with my brother, with whom I am in partnership in a thriving retail business. My brother and I inherited this business from our father, and we earn enough to provide for our own families and support our widowed mother and to unmarried sisters.

Virginia nags me all the time because I put in long hours at the store, and she is always complaining that my brother lives like a gentleman and spends time with his family, while I am always at the store. She seems to think that I ought to have more income from the store and that I ought to have a greater share in it than my brother.

We have always been brought up to work together and share alike, and I cannot think of breaking up with my brother or demanding more than he takes. As for the hours I put in, it so happens I like to wait on customers and hate to do the book-keeping and other phases of the work. My brother takes naturally to all the things I don't like to do, and I was happy we made such a good team—until my wife started to nag me about it.

VIRGINIA—We have three children at home who practical-

ly never see their father, while my brother-in-law has no children and is always taking his wife out or giving a party in their fine home. When I suggest to my husband that he get his brother to share the night hours with him so he can spend some time home, he suggests I put in some time in the store. His family has no regard for his family, and that is why I argue with him.

THE COUNCIL: Virginia is putting the wrong foot forward. Her problem is not the relationship between the brothers, but her own husband.

He apparently does not have enough feeling for brotherly or social life. It does not appear it is the brother who is at fault here, but Stanley evidently would be lost in the business if he did not have his brother to lean on for the "brain work."

The solution of this complex problem calls for subtlety and charm, rather than constant nagging and contention. The brother might turn out to be an ally if he were made aware of the problem in an inoffensive way.

We do not advise that she neglect her three children to help out at the store, but it might serve a useful purpose if she were to spend a little time there—just enough to acquire a better understanding of her husband and his problems and weaknesses. Her proper goal should be to bring the brothers closer together in a better understanding, instead of trying to
