High Winds Stir Dust in Southwest

High winds stirred up new dust clouds over the parched Southwest yesterday.

The dust swept into Gila Bend, Ariz., in front of 40 miles per hour winds. At Litchfield Park, Ariz., residents strained to identify objects a half mile away and visibility dropped to below a mile at Phoenix.

The dust coincided with thunderstorms in the Southwest, but most of the rain had ended today. The only precipitation, most of it light, was from Eastern Ohio through central New England and Central Texas and over the southern Rockies and southern plateau.

Big Cave Searched For Three Missing College Students

Scottsboro, Ala. — (U.P.) — Explorers started an all-out search of vast "Whistling Cave" today for three persons, believed to be Vanderbilt university students, reported lost since Tuesday.

Seven searchers sent an urgent call for help after finding a note shortly after midnight which provided first evidence that the report was not a hoax.

The note, scrawled on toilet tissue and dated last Tuesday, contained on one side the word, "Lost," and on the other side, "George, one light left. R. S., April 14."

Companions Identified

The hunt had been touched off by a George Pike who said his lost companions were Ray Smith, James Mann and John Wilson, all of Nashville, Tenn.

An "outside" man who spread the alarm Thursday had vanished afterward, and possibly now was a fourth person lost in the five-mile, dual-level labyrinth of the limestone cavern 15 miles from here.

Bill Varndoe, president of the Huntsville, Ala., Speleological Society, sent out a call for a roundup of other members, saying apparently the bona fide note was found deep in the cave.

Varndoe and six other society members had searched Thursday afternoon and night, and were about to give up when the note was found.

Pelton Dam Project Work Gets Under Way

Madras, Ore. — (U.P.) — Work on Portland General Electric company's Pelton dam project on the Deschutes river was under way today.

A \$6,534,349 contract between PGE and the Guy F. Atkinson company of Portland was signed Wednesday. First job for the dam will be entrances for the 600-foot diversion tunnel at the main dam.

About 100 men are working with some 350 expected to be on the job within a month.

A PGE official said in Portland that a ground breaking ceremony to signal commencement of the project would be held May 1.
