Industrial shares, the worst losers, had their severest loss in about two weeks. Rails, recent strong spots, resisted pressure much better and gave up only a fraction of their average. Utilities continued their decline in progress for some time.

Judge's Widow To Be US Commissioner

Portland — (U.P.)—Mrs. Claire Mundorff, widow of the late Judge Lowell Mundorff of Multnomah county circuit court, yesterday was appointed United States commissioner in the federal court here.

Mrs. Mundorff, a graduate of Northwestern College of Law and the mother of four children is the first woman in the Pacific Northwest to hold the position of United States commissioner and is one of few women ever appointed to the post in the nation.

Mrs. Mundorff succeeds Robert A. Leedy who has resigned, effective May 1, to devote his time exclusively to his private law practice.

Mexican 'Wetbacks' Will Be Returned

Ontario — (U.P.)—A troop of five border patrolmen of the immigration department left here yesterday with 14 "wetbacks," illegal Mexican immigrants, who were rounded up in southeastern Oregon and southwestern Idaho during the past week.

The 14 Mexicans, all employed as farm laborers, had been lodged in the Malheur county jail at Vale pending their transfer to Portland. From Portland they will be flown back to Mexico.

MM Will Reduce Plywood Production

Portland — (U.P.)—The M and M Wood Working Company here announced yesterday that plywood production will be reduced about 20 per cent at its plants at Portland, Albany, Lyons and Idanha.

Spokesmen for the company said that most of the reduction will come from overtime schedules but some third shift work may be eliminated at the plants.

Reason for the cutback in production was given as adjusting schedules to incoming orders.

The anti-Communist broadcasting station quoted a recent refugee as saying nearly one-third of the 1,500 laborers hastily constructing the plant at Rez are forced labor.
