

### Washington Takes Meet; Records Fall

Washington grade school won two classes and the medley relay and tied for first in the other track meet in a triangular track meet in which two records were broken and another tied.

In Class A Washington won with 26 points, Jackson had 22½ and Roosevelt 17½. Roosevelt and Washington had 26½ each and Jackson 13 in Class B. In Class C Washington rolled up 35 3/5 to 27 1/5 by Roosevelt and 2 1/5 by Jackson.

The two records which fell were in Class B. Dennis Gaster of Washington ran the 60-yard dash in 7.8 seconds and James Cabler of Washington threw the baseball 206 feet, bettering by more than 9 feet Henry Mack of Washington in the Class A 220-yard dash in 28.6 to tie the record.

Victories for Savage over Bobby Boyd and Holly Mims spell nothing but trouble for Joseph in his try to make his TV ring debut a successful quest for a 38th straight victory. Savage has everything going for him—experience, punching power and durability.

### Don Cockell, Jack Gardner Lose; Gavilan Victor in London Bout

London — (U.P.) — Two of the biggest upsets in British ring history put Promoter Jack Solomons virtually out of business today.

Solomons' biggest drawing cards, British heavyweight champion Don Cockell and Jack Gardner, suffered humiliating second round knockouts Tuesday night on the same program that featured Kid Gavilan's "revenge" victory over young Peter Waterman.

Kiltone Lave, an unheralded heavyweight from Tonga in the Friendly Islands, knocked out Cockell while Joe Bygraves of Jamaica, B.W.I, stopped Gardner, the leading contender for Cockell's title.

**Popular Decision**

A crowd of 10,000 at Earle Court stadium later watched Gavilan counter-punch his way to a popular 10-round decision over Waterman, who had scored

a disputed verdict over the former world welterweight titleholder two months ago.

Solomons' next move probably will be to match Lave and Bygraves. However, Bygraves already owns a decision over the upstart from the southwest Pacific and such a bout wouldn't guarantee a big crowd in England.

Regarding Waterman, he is a young and exciting fighter but his loss to Gavilan proved to Solomons that the Britisher needs more experience before rating another top-drawer bout.

Gavilan trained hard for the return match and it paid off handsomely. The Cuban "Keed" twice floored Waterman, bloodied his nose and cut him severely about the face with his furious punching. At the finish, the crowd applauded Gavilan and the decision.

### Tornado Tips Ashland 5-4 to Tighten Chase

Medford high school's determined baseballers tightened up the Southern Oregon Conference pennant chase yesterday by edging the Ashland high Grizzlies 5 to 4 at Ashland.

With a six-hit hurling job by Ernie Tyler, some heavy slugging by Duane Sides and Larry Gober and topnotch fielding by Jim Putney and Ed Reinking, the Black Tornado pulled within one game of the loop leading Grizzlies and took over lone hold on second place in the standings.

Medford has an opportunity now to knot for first in the conference. Ashland comes here for a tangle on Friday.

The Tornado built up a 5 to 0 bulge in yesterday's encounter. Tyler, pitching his first full game of the year and earning his second victory, yielded only one hit in the first four innings. He was reached for three in the fifth frame and two in the sixth as the Ashlanders threatened to catch up. But Tyler proved a tough little contender and weathered the storm.

**Sides Homers**

Sides for Medford and Lance Lock for Ashland walloped home runs.

A single run crossed for Medford in the opening stanza. Reinking walked and Gober came through with a long swat over the rightfielder's head for a triple. Two runs came home in the second for the Tornado. Sides three-baggered, Dennis King lined to right field for a single and Tyler then squeezed King home.

In the fourth inning Sides singled and went to second on an error. Tyler got a walk. Gordon Owley slammed the ball to Gene Parent at third base. Parent fumbled and the bases were loaded. Perkins singled to drive in a run. Sides in the fifth inning slammed his roundtripper, a long line drive over left center

field.

Hits by Locke, Don Simpson and Bob Alley and a wild pitch got Ashland two runs in the fifth inning. In the sixth Parent singled for the Grizzlies, and Locke followed with a sharp liner to left field for his homer.

Four of the hits Tyler gave were of the scratch variety. He walked no one and struck out six batters. Mark Fitch gave up all seven hits that Medford knocked. He struck out four before being relieved in the sixth inning and Parent fanned one. Each of the Ashland pitchers walked four.

Sides had a perfect day at the plate with a single, triple and homer in three batting tries. Gober tripled and singled in four times up.

Jim Putney played a top game at third base for Medford and was a key in the victory with several great fielding stops. Reinking made a couple of nice running catches in center field.

Medford has two games on the week end, following its Friday mix with Ashland by entertaining Yreka, Calif., here Saturday afternoon. Ashland won two previous contests with Medford 6 to 5 and 3 to 2.

## Hard-Slugging Boyer Spurs Card Victory; Yanks Continue Pace

The victory was the Yankees' sixth in seven starts this year. Veteran Steve Gromek held the Kansas City Athletics to six hits as his Detroit Tiger teammates rapped out 10 hits, including three homers, in a 7-4 victory.

Bill Miller drove in four runs with a homer and a single while Ray Boone and Reno Bertoia, who looks like the answer to Detroit's second base problem, also homered. Bertoia collected three of the Tigers' hits. Arnie Portocarrero was the loser.

Inclement weather caused the postponement of four games. The game between Boston and Baltimore was wiped out in the American league while in the National league, the games between Milwaukee and Chicago, New York and Pittsburgh, and Brooklyn and Philadelphia were called off.

In his last 20 times up, Boyer has connected safely 13 times. He tagged Redleg starter Pat Scantlebury for his third homer of the season with two on in the first inning Tuesday night and drove in another run in the seventh with a single off reliever Hal Jeffcoat.

No Cardinal pitcher has gone the distance yet this year but the way Boyer has been hitting, it hardly has been noticed.

**Posts Second Victory**

Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell, who posted his second victory at the expense of Cincinnati, has come the closest of any St. Louis hurler. For the second time this year, he lasted until the ninth inning and then needed help from rubber-armed Ellis Kinder.

Mizell gave up six of Cincinnati's seven hits and struck out five, shutting out the Redlegs until the eighth when ex-Card Ray Jablonski smashed his fifth homer with two on.

The New York Yankees, continuing their fast getaway in the American league, defeated the Washington Senators, 4-1, as young Johnny Kucks gained his second triumph.

Southpaw Chuck Stobbs, the only pitcher to beat the Yanks so far this year, was the victim of home runs by Hank Bauer and Yogi Berra. Bauer blasted his homer with two on in the fourth inning and Berra slammed his fourth of the year with the bases empty in the seventh.

Kucks spaced seven Senator hits and was aided by five double plays, four of them by the same combination of Gil McDougald, Jerry Lumpe and Bill Skovron. Lumpe took part in all five double plays and had nine assists and five putouts in all.

### Eagle Freshmen Subdue Phoenix

Eagle Point — Eagle Point high beat Phoenix 74 to 39 here yesterday in a freshman track meet.

The Eagles won 11 of the 13 events and had two triple winners, David Huffman and Bill McClure. Huffman took the high hurdles, high jump and 160-yard dash. McClure won the 70-yard sprint, the broad jump and low hurdles. The two were on the winning relay team with Rodney Collins and Dusty Gerbing.

Roger Hooper won the shot put and discus for EP and Fred Hays doubled in the 330 and 660-yard runs. Myers won the three-fourth mile for Phoenix and Korth the javelin for the Pirates.

Huffman's broad jump was 18 feet five inches.

### Government Contends IBC Loans Tough on Other Ring Promoters

New York — (U.P.) — The International Boxing club, operating like a finance company except that it charged no interest, gave big loans to champion fighters which made it virtually impossible for other promoters to deal with them for bouts, the federal government charged today.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Lawrence Gochberg, directing the government anti-monopoly suit against the IBC, stated that a total of \$451,042 was made to champions, top contenders and their managers within a four year period, from 1949 to 1953.

Gochberg said that the loans represented advances on purses for major fights and that the government as such did not regard this as objectionable.

Difficult

"But combined with the other practices of the IBC it made it difficult for other promoters to get championship matches," Gochberg said.

The fighters involved and the money they received in advance payments were Kid Gavilan \$55,830; Jersey Joe Walcott \$15,000; Joe Louis \$30,750; Johnny Brat-

ton \$45,812; and Rocky Graziano \$9,750.

The managers and the amounts they received were Ike Bernstein \$11,784; Bill Daly \$12,500; Jack Kearns \$8,250; George Gairford \$9,250; Frank Blinky Palermo \$1,000; Hymie Wallman \$12,500.
