Advance Farmer Payments Disrupted

Washington — (U.P.) — The farm fight in Congress narrowed today to a struggle over whether to pay farmers this year for cut-backs in crops next year.

Both Republicans and Democrats pushed soil bank bills in the House. The \$1,200,000,000 programs differed mainly on the question of advance payments. Democrats charged the GOP pre-payment plan is an effort to buy farmers' votes. Republicans charged that Democratic delays made the plan necessary if farmers are to get help this year.

A showdown in the House scheduled for this afternoon was postponed. It is expected to come about the middle of next week.

Doll Family Arrives At Child Clinic Here

A family of dolls has arrived at the southern Oregon child guidance clinic, 307 Leverette building, as a gift from the telephone area and secondary schools in seven western states and Hawaii and Alaska is nearing completion as part of Standard Oil Company of California's 1956 highway cleanup campaign.

The project of providing dolls for the clinic's study and treatment program started by the group in March. Mrs. Earl Bowman is president. A baked goods sale provided funds for the project.

The use of dolls in the clinic was explained by Miss Mary Vandenberg, psychiatric social worker. Possibilities of family or school groupings help a child to express feelings which he would not do otherwise. The child can act out with the dolls, the need to act out in behavior at home and school may be relieved, she continued.

The use of dolls is a valuable tool in understanding basic problems and treatment of a child's relationships, Miss Vandenberg said.

Besides contributions of civic groups, the clinic is financed in several other ways. Anyone can help in the work of the clinic by becoming a member and supporting its program through membership.
