## President Calls For Friendship

Chicago — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower called for "genuine friendship" for all peoples of the tense Near East in a message today to the opening conference of the American Council of Judaism.

The council, an organization of American Jews opposed to Zionism, stresses the difference between religion and nationalism. Council members are expected to discuss ways of offsetting "the myth of a Jewish vote" during this election year.

Mr. Eisenhower said, "tension and hostility in the Near East require now more than ever before the pursuance of policies based on genuine friendship for all the peoples of the area."

To help remove the shadows of war from the Near East, the president said, "a more widespread understanding of the traditions and beliefs that animate its people will assist Americans to follow with perseverance a right and just course."

Salem — (U.P.) — Some 200 high school boys and girls from over the state gathered here today for the annual meeting of the YMCA youth legislature on Friday and Saturday.

## Bees Liberated When Truck Wrecks Near Bend

Bend — (U.P.) — Some 8,000 honey bees were liberated yesterday when a truck bound from Sacramento, Calif., to Edmonton, Alberta, turned over here.

The shipment of bees included 2,330 packages with 3,500 bees to the package. Bees clouded the area near the north city limits of Bend, but cold weather slowed them down and no stings were reported.

David Swan of Viny, Alberta, driver of the truck, said the swerved sharply to avoid a collision with an oncoming car and that the truck overturned.

## PSC Moves Nearer To Education Goal

Portland — (U.P.) — Portland State College moved a step nearer its goal as an accredited institution yesterday with filing of a preliminary accrediting report by the State Board of Education.

The board conducted a two-day inspection of the school following a similar accrediting report filed by the Northwest association of Secondary Schools. Action by the association, however, will not become final until it is adopted at the annual meeting in December.

Joint action by the state board and the association will mean that Portland State credits may be transferred to any accredited college or university in the nation and graduates in education will be certified to teach in Oregon schools.

The state inspection team was headed by Mrs. Joy Hills Guber, assistant to the state superintendent of public instruction.
