# Graham Prosecution Attempts To Prove Time Bomb in Plane

Denver — (U.P.)—The prosecution in the John Gilbert Graham murder trial attempted today to prove that a time bomb blasted an airliner in flight and caused it to crash in a lonely sugar beet field near Longmont, Colo., last Nov. 1.

A key witness in the state's effort to prove the bomb theory is J. William Magee, an explosive expert from the FBI laboratory in Washington.

District Attorney Bert M. Keating said Magee's testimony would show, in detail, that dynamite exploded in the United Air Lines DC6B seconds before it crashed and killed all 44 persons aboard.

**Specific Charge**  
The 24-year-old Graham is charged specifically with the murder of his mother, Mrs. Daisy King, 54, one of the crash victims. He allegedly planted the homemade time bomb in her luggage shortly before the plane took off from Denver's Staple Airport.

Keating said Magee's testimony "definitely will tie the actual explosion's source to dynamite."

The district attorney said he planned to follow Magee's testimony with that of Lyman Brown, a Kremmling, Colo., general store manager. Keating said Brown would attempt to identify Graham as the man to whom he sold 20 sticks of dynamite and two dynamite caps on Oct. 29—three days before the crash.

**Fragments Introduced**  
Several small fragments found in the wreckage of the plane, presumably bits of the bomb the state contends blew up the plane, probably will be linked with Magee's testimony. The blackened fragments were introduced as evidence by the state yesterday without being identified other than they were found in the wreckage.

The prosecution is expected to climax its case with an attempt to introduce as evidence a confession Graham made and signed to the FBI but which he later repudiated.

The defense undoubtedly will oppose introduction of the confession with the result likely being lengthy arguments before District Judge Joseph M. McDonald in the absence of the jury.

**Navy To Seek New Altitude Record**  
Washington — (U.P.)—The Navy will try to set a world altitude record next Tuesday at the White Sands, N.M., proving grounds with a new type rocket. The altitude goal is at least 190 miles.

The Navy will fire into the thin air an Aerobee-Hi rocket with a 120-pound payload. It will carry a version of the radio transmitter that will be used in the earth satellite vehicle next year.

The present record for a single state rocket is 158 miles, set by a Viking rocket on May 24, 1934. Although the Navy set the altitude goal at 190 miles, it said the research rocket may go even higher.

Unlike the Viking, the Aerobee-Hi is boosted into the air by a small, solid propellant booster rocket which falls away after about three seconds.

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# Stock Broker Named in Swindle

New York — (U.P.)—A federal grand jury yesterday indicted a Jersey City stock broker, already facing trial in a \$900,000 Seattle telephone stock swindle, on charges he defrauded some 50,000 investors in a \$15,000,000 uranium stock deal.

U. S. attorneys described the accused, Walter F. Teller, 54, as president of one of the nation's biggest over-the-counter stock firms, Teller and Co.

The government charged that Teller used radio, television and newspaper advertising to sell 20,000,000 shares in Consolidated Uranium Mines, Inc., of Salt Lake City at prices up to \$1.87 per share. In one operation he bought 250,000 shares of the stock at one cent a share and then sold them at a much higher price after zooming the market price by "promotional activities and false representation of the condition of the company and its prospects," prosecutors said.

Consolidated Uranium Mines had nothing to do with Teller's activities, the government emphasized, and had protested to Teller about "exaggerated" statements in his sales literature.

The grand jury heard several disappointed investors tell how Teller advised them to "put this stock away for your grandchildren. It's going up to \$20 a share."

The stock now is selling for 20 cents a share, the government said.

# Powell Surrenders To U. S. Marshal

San Francisco — (U.P.)—John W. Powell, former editor of the China Monthly Review, and his wife Sylvia surrendered to the U. S. Marshal today on charges of committing sedition.

The Powells, accompanied by attorney Doris Brin Walker, appeared at the marshal's office at 10:55 a.m. They handed newsmen a full-page typewritten statement in which they said:

"We have certainly not committed any act of sedition. We reject this accusation as entirely false. We are proud to be American citizens and affirm our loyalty to our country."

The Powells, together with a former associate, Julian Schuman of New York, were named in an indictment returned yesterday by the federal grand jury here.

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The funds will be used to build a new junior high school and make major additions to the two present junior high schools. They also will provide for a multi-purpose room for a grade school.
