Lydia — He's too choosy about adoption.
George — I refuse to take a potluck.

Lydia: George and I have been married five years, but there are no children and apparently no hope of ever having children. We are both deeply disappointed and have talked about adopting children.

Unfortunately, we have developed such sharp differences of opinion that I'm afraid we will never succeed in bringing about an adoption. George has very definite specifications as to the kind of child, what it should look like and what kind of parents it should come from.

I feel that attitude makes it hopeless, in view of the fact that the childless parents seeking to adopt babies outnumber the homeless babies many times over. My own feeling is that I want a baby whom I can love and whose love I can win, and the origin of the baby can just as well be a complete mystery.

I have hesitated to tell George exactly how I feel because I have already so disappointed him in not having babies of our own, and I would like him to have his way. I am afraid, however, we will never succeed in adopting a baby if we get too choosy.

George: I'm afraid Lydia is letting sentiment run away with her judgment. We choose each other for certain qualities and reasons, and we should be able to choose a baby. If we can't have our own, we should come as close as we can by choosing.

I don't believe in taking potluck in a matter as important as this. It may be unfair to the child, as well as to us.

The Council: Both Lydia and George are making mistakes that should be corrected. Lydia's big mistake is in failing to tell George exactly how she feels. She is allowing a false feeling of guilt to distort her attitude. She is not guilty of anything. The failure to have children is just as likely to be due to the husband as the wife.

Even if it has been definitely established in this case that the wife alone is incapable of having children, this is still not a matter of guilt, however, if Lydia were not to take her husband fully into her confidence by telling him just how she feels.

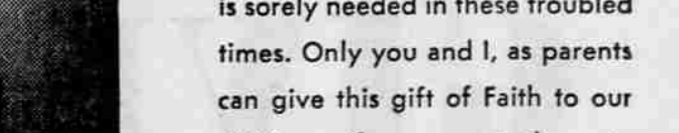
