Mrs. Annetta B. Antle, 81, wife of the late Richard F. (Dick) Antle, died Sunday at her home at 127 North Ivy st. Mrs. Antle died about five years ago.

Mrs. Antle had lived in Medford since she was 16 years old and before her marriage to Mr. Antle in 1938 she was the widow of John Barneburg, well-known valley cattleman, who she married when she was 17, a year after arriving in Medford from Portland with her parents, Capt. and Mrs. Edward Kellogg. She was born in Goldendale, Wash. Her parents for many years operated Coker Butte orchards.

Mrs. Antle was active in St. Mark's Episcopal church and in church guild work until becoming ill about two years ago.

As the wife of Mr. Barneburg, a member of a pioneer family, she lived on the old Barneburg ranch where radio station KBOY is now located. They also lived at Illihee orchards and then on north Orange st., until Mr. Barneburg, a former county commissioner, was struck by a car and died in the early 1930s.

Despite a series of proposals by the United States, Russia and Britain and France, sources said there was not enough progress to warrant continuation of the talks which are in recess until Wednesday.

Traffic Accident Emergency Called As Toll Increases

Chicago — (U.P.) — The National Safety Council declared a national "traffic accident emergency" today in the wake of the worst March highway death toll in history.

In telegrams to each of the state governors, the council warned "a traffic accident emergency exists in the United States." It urged all-out action to end the "critical" situation and stop rising highway deaths.

The March dead numbered 2,960 — 12 per cent more than in March, 1955, the council said. It broke the March, 1937, record of 2,866 and was the 13th consecutive month that traffic deaths have mounted.

As if to emphasize the council's warning, week end news was studded with reports of multi-fatality auto crashes.

Near Eland, Wis., a head-on collision wiped out seven lives. Four of the victims were children.

The La Crosse, Wis., record of 857 days without a traffic fatality ended in another head-on smashup. Two little boys were killed.

Regional Conferences

The safety council issued its alarm on the eve of four regional conferences planned by President Eisenhower's Committee for Traffic Safety. The meetings will be held next month in Atlantic City, N.J., Miami, Chicago, and San Francisco.

The council warned that unless deaths are to top the 38,300 level of 1955, the lives of 500 persons a month below the last year's figures must be saved. A council spokesman said a continuation of the 1956 trend will mean the 1941 all-time record of 39,969 deaths will be surpassed.
