

Showdown Believed Coming in Campaign To Discard Nixon

Washington — (U.P.) — It looks like an early and quiet showdown is coming with the last remaining Ike men who don't want Vice President Richard M. Nixon on this year's Republican ticket.

Two major figures in the Citizens-For-Eisenhower committee already are on record with a proposal to change the organization's name to Citizens-For-Eisenhower-And-Nixon. They are Peter H. Clayton, secretary and counsel for the committee, and James Murphy, 1952 national chairman of Citizens-For-Eisenhower.

Murphy and Clayton are important men in the committee, but they do not control it. Gen. Lucius D. Clay and some others still are to be heard from.

Clay is believed to prefer to await Republican National Convention action before committing

Citizens-For-Eisenhower all-out to Nixon's renomination.

The general was among a considerable group of the President's friends, influential men but mostly political amateurs, who wanted to dump Nixon.

Most of the steam leaked from the dump-Nixon movement some weeks ago. Since Mr. Eisenhower welcomed Nixon as a running mate last week the boiler has gone all but dead. Some kind of policy announcement from Citizens-For-Eisenhower headquarters now seems likely.

If none come, it will be widely assumed that some members of the committee still believe Nixon may be sidetracked. The Democratic leadership will follow developments with unusual interest. The top Democratic leadership rates Nixon as Public Enemy No. 1.

Some are convinced the vice president will cost the Republican ticket 3,000,000 or so votes on election day.

There are not many available Republicans who can match Nixon as a vigorous campaigner. One of the weaknesses of the dump-Nixon movement was the inability of anti-Nixon forces to

Methodists To Act On Segregation

Minneapolis, Minn. — (U.P.) — The General conference of the Methodist church will act tomorrow on a recommendation striking at racial segregation within the church, it was reported today.

The 80-man conference committee studying plans to end church segregation plans to present the statement of policy to the delegates. It is expected to study the racial segregation issue during the next four years before taking positive action.

The policy statement calls on Methodists' 40,000 United States congregations to admit congregations "without reference to color."

"There must be no place in the Methodist church for racial discrimination or enforced segregation," the proposed recommendation says.

"Our pastors, upon whom rests the responsibility of receiving individuals into church membership should discharge this responsibility without reference to race, color, or national origin."

The main topic before the quadrennial conference today is a four-year church program to raise \$37,000,000 to improve 162 Methodist universities and colleges and to build up rundown parishes.

Debate on the proposal is already completed and it was expected to win final approval at today's session.

Next Saturday the three contestants will face questions worth \$10,000. If they continue giving the correct answers they will eventually reach the top question, worth \$100,000.

Only 'Liquor Holders' Sent To Latin America

Washington — (U.P.) — Only men who can "hold their liquor" are assigned to the U.S. Air Forces technical missions in 14 Latin American countries.

Lt. Col. Samuel H. Runyan, assistant chief of missions, gave that assurance in secret testimony recently before a House Appropriations Subcommittee.

He explained that members of the mission are selected primarily for their technical skills, but that one of their jobs, too, is to make social contacts. "If they are the type who cannot hold their liquor or get out of line, we do not want them," he said.

U. S. Presents Two Jet Trainers To Iran

Tehran, Iran — (U.P.) — The United States presented two Lockheed Shooting Star jet training planes to Iran Sunday in a military ceremony at Tehran's Mehrabad airport.

The planes were the first to be received by the Iranian air force. They were flown from Germany, where 15 Iranian air force officers received training earlier this year.
